Democrats Concede Carter's Election in Montana, but Claim the Governor.

BISMARCK, N. D., Special Telegram, -Miller will have 10,000 majority. In the small counties west of Jamestown Miller's majorities size up as follows: Burleigh, 450; Morton, 400; Stark 250; Billings, Mercer and Oliver, 150; McLean, 150; Emmons, 300; McIntosh, 250; Logan and Kidder, 300. Total, 2,250. In the James river valley his majority will be 1,300. In Sargent, Ransom, Barnes, Griggs and Steele, 2,000 majority. In the counties on the Manitoba west of Grand Forks, 1,500 majority. In the B:d river valley proper, 3,000 majority. This makes a total of 10,000. The liquor men are alarmed. The vote upon prohibi-tion, upon their figuring, is close. The counties west of Jamestown and three in the James Valley aggregate 2,600 majority against prohibition. The Democrats in the legislature will not exceed fifteen.

PROHIBITION MAJORITIES. FARGO, N. Dakota, Special Telegram, The general result of the vote on prohibition throughout the state is not yet known. It was reported to-night that Richland, Ran som, Dickey, Sargent, Ramsey, Traill, Barnes, Walsh, Grand Forks and Bottineau counties have given an aggregate majority of 1,500 to 1,800 for the amendment, but this is not believed by many who are in a position to know. Grand Forks and Walsh are said to be the only counties in which the constitution met with any serious opposition. Col. Geary, chairman of the state central committee, estimates the Republican majority for governor throug the state at 5,000 or 5,500, and for congressman at

It denounces election frauds and opposes the scheme for a national election law. Republican par-tisanship and the policy of the administra-tion regarding civil service and pensions are condemued. Local option is layored. A law compelling the publication and limita-tion of campaign expenses is favored, as is also the principle of secret voting.
