ORDINANCE NO. 37.

An ordinance relating to Scavengers. The City Council of the city of New Ulm do ordain:

Sec. 1. After the passage and approval of this ordinance, and annually thereafter on the second Tuesday in April of each year when other city officers are appointed, the Mayor shall appoint a City Scavenger, subject to confirmation by the City Council, whose term of office shall be one year and until his successor is appointed and qualified; provided that the first appointment hereunder shall expire on the next third Tuesday in April.

Sec. 2. The City Council may at any time by resolution or otherwise fix maximum rates of compensation for work to be done by such scavenger under this ordinance, and they may also require him to give bond for the proper and faithful performance of such work in such amount as they may direct. The Mayor may also at any time suspend or discharge such scavenger for cause, whenever in his opinion the circumstances may warrant such action.

Sec. 3. Such scavenger shall provide himself with a wagon or other vehicle with a covered water-tight box for the removal of the contents of privy vaults and other matter emitting an offensive odor or being disgusting to sight.

All matter referred to in this ordinance, removed by the City Scavenger or any other person, shall be removed, deposited or buried in such manner and at such points within or outside the city limits as the Health Officer of the city may direct and approve. Such removal of matter shall be done in such manner as to prevent any loss or smell on the way or at the place of deposit.

Sec. 4. It shall be the special duty of such scavenger when requested by the owner, agent or occupant of any premises within the limits of this city, to remove the contents of privy vaults and cleanse the same, also to empty and clean any vault, sink, sewer and private drain; and to remove all offal, swill, garbage, rubbish, ashes, dead animals and other nuisances from private grounds, at such compensation as may be agreed upon

by the parties, subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

Such scavenger may also be required to clean the streets, alleys and public grounds in said city or such parts of the same at such times and in such manner as the city council may direct.

Sec. 5. Such City Scavenger, under the direction of the Mayor, any police officer, or member of the Board of Health, shall have power and it is his duty to enter upon any premises, between sunrise and sunset, for the purpose of examining any vault, privy, sink, sewer or private drain; and he shall be permitted access to any and all parts of buildings necessary for such examination, and also for the purpose of cleaning the same, when necessary.

Sec. 6. No scavenger or other person shall open any privy vault or disturb the contents thereof between the hours of five o'clock a. m. and nine o'clock p. m. of any day. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as to prevent any person from cleansing his own privy vault, provided the same is done substantially as in this ordinance directed relative to the time, place of deposit and manner of removal of the same.

Sec. 7. Any violation of or neglect to comply with the provisions of this ordinance, on the part of any scavenger or other person, or refusal of any owner or occupant of any premises or buildings to be examined as herein provided, shall be summarily punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars and costs and be imprisoned until such time and costs are paid not exceeding sixty days.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after approval and publication.
