Last Monday was a field day for the republicans of Adair county.

The greenback county convention met last Saturday and made the following nominations:

George Shaw, representative; J. K. P. Morelock, sheriff; R. M. Bushman, collector; P. D. Shoop, judge; J. H. Ranier, judge; W. N. Hopp, treasurer; C. A. Allgaier, public administrator; W. P. Linder, prosecuting attorney; P. Bulkeley, assessor; J. Mercer, attorney; Dr. Still, coroner.

At noon Saturday the Adair county republican convention was called to order by the chairman of the central committee, B. E. Hohny, and D. M. Draper elected temporary chairman, and J. W. Johnson, of Clay, temporary secretary.

After the appointment of the usual committees, the convention adjourned until 1 p. m.

Convention re-assembled. The temporary officers were made the permanent officers of the convention.

Reports of the other committees received, and the committees discharged. Voting to be done by ballot and the man receiving a majority of all the votes cast to be declared the nominee.

F. M. Harrington was put in nomination by John Richey. There being no other nomination, convention proceeded to ballot. Harrington's nomination was then made unanimous.

For collector, Mr. R. G. Bielby was put in nomination by John Rowison, and M. V. Arterberry by Buf. Richey.

The vote stood: Bielby.....28, Arterberry.....25, Mr. Bielby's nomination was then made unanimous.

For sheriff John Richey put in nomination Wm. Herron, and R. Richey, of Pettis, John Shaver.

Result of ballot: Shaver.....29, Herron.....24, Mr. Shaver's nomination was then made unanimous.

Peter J. Brown was unanimously nominated for treasurer, and J. W. Waddill, of Saltriver, was nominated for assessor.

T. J. Dockery was nominated for surveyor; Geo. Williams for public administrator; A. D. Risdon for prosecuting attorney; and John Waddell for coroner. S. F. Stahl was nominated for county judge in the 1st district and J. Q. Johnson in the 2d district.

While all the men before the convention were good men, the selections made gives general satisfaction, and we believe every man on the ticket will be elected by a good majority.

Jury appointed to assess damages to H. Vandeburg by reason of the location of road petitioned for by I. N. Meeks, et al, reported said damages at \$140. Petitioners were given to January 1st, 1891, to pay said damages, when the road would be declared a public highway.

S. M. Crawford et al and Thos. Welsh et al petitioned for the vacation of certain roads, and said roads were ordered vacated at petitioners' costs.

Thos. Welsh was appointed overseer road district 6 Clay township.

Edward Greenwood, David Tuttle, and George Simmons were appointed a jury to assess damages of a private road petitioned for by Robt. Probst, Jr.

F. M. Johnson was appointed overseer district 6 Liberty township.

The unsold parts of school sections 16-61-17 and 16-63-17 were ordered sold.

C. F. Mercer's bond for \$150 to school fund was approved.

He was picked up in an insensible condition and taken to the residence of Mr. Early Corbin. Two boys and a little girl escaped unhurt.
