Now, the advantage of breeding a certain strain ought to be obvious to any one who will think of it for a little time. For instance, a buyer may fancy certain breed, but the specimens shown him by one breeder may not fill his eye. The birds may be too tall, or the combs may be too large, or there may be a lack of that broad, full breast which most buyers might fancy, and which this particular breeder had left out, in order to give some other points more prominence.

These very points, though not satisfactory to one buyer, might be the ones sought for by another; and the great advantage of the strain is, that a breeder can sell his customer birds that shall be sure to hold to certain

Leg Feathering On Asiatics.

Much has been written about leg feathering on Asiatics, some writers claiming it as very objectionable, others wishing to alter the Standard and do away with it altogether. I, as an admirer of Asiatics in general, and a breeder of Light Brahmas in particular have failed find to any of the so-called objections; but on the contrary, l claim that leg feathering is both useful and beautiful. That it is useful, I have demonstrated to my own satisfaction time after time.

In raising birds for market, I find that I can generally get better prices for Light Brahmas than for other breeds Now when the birds are dressed how could I prove them to be brahmas if not by their leg feathers? I have spoken to several poultry dealers who supply the Boston market, and they tell me that a ready sale is always found for Light Brahmas. They would above, and do not find that the feathers spoil their looks or are in any way detrimental to the birds when dressed. In frozen. Asiatics are all right, as their toe feathers protect their toes and keep them warm.

A great deal of the popularity of Asiatics has been solely due to their leg feathering. Strangers to fowls, upon entering a yard where several varieties are kept, are invaribly attracted by the fine adpearance of the Asi atics, and generally make some remark complimentary to their leg feathering. I have seen Asiatics with clean legs, but I did not like them at all. Their legs seemed too slender for their large bodies and looked out of place altogether. I am not prejudiced agaist clean legged towls, but I would son can take care of many more fowls just as soon see the clean legs feather-
