Down with the strikers.

The O. K. road is still O. K.

No sympathy for strikers in the present strike.

The man who has the most sympathy for the striker, is the man who is farthest from him.

The Populists were too cold, however, to be easily heated to the fusion point.

The sympathy of the public is generally with the laboring man, but in the present strike the strikers have forfeited all respect, and must take the consequences of their own mad actions.

This is a free country, and every man who wants to quit work may do so, but he has no more right to say that another man shall not work than he has to break into his house and steal his property.

President Cleveland is uneasy over the magnitude of the present strike.

He should console himself, however, with the thought that, if it comes to war, he can do as he did during the rebellion—hire a substitute.

When the Democratic convention adjourned two weeks ago, to await the meeting of the Populist convention, it was thought the Populists were courting fusion.

But when they came to town last Saturday they did not wear their courting clothes, and were very shy of the Democrats.

P. F. Greenwood's speech before the Democratic convention two weeks ago, in which he portrayed in glowing colors the beauties and benefits of the pie counter, should the Democrats and Populists fuse, seems to have had the opposite effect from that intended.

He wrought the Populists up to such a pitch that they determined to play a lone hand, and, if possible, capture the entire pie counter for themselves.

From the tone of the Kirkville Democrat of this week, one would think that the Populist party, like the serpent, had turned and stung the hand that warmed it into life.

The very latest news from the great strike shows that the situation has somewhat improved. It became necessary Thursday to fire into the strikers in Chicago, who were going about overturning cars, and destroying property.

Gov. Stone has written Sheriff Barton, of Linn county, that the entire state will be at his back in protecting the Taylor brothers from mob violence.

The great strike that is now paralyzing the business of the country began in the Pullman lumber yards at Chicago.
