Council Meeting

The first meeting of the new council was held Monday night and all members were present except Mr. Long. The council now consists of Mayor W. E. Noonan and Councilmen Geo. Meeks, John Caskey, Sig Jonas, John Morris, Dan. Kent, J. M. Long, B. J. Trowbridge and W. D. Willard.

Mayor Noonan announced his committees for the ensuing year and the council confirmed them. They are as follows: Improvement committee, Caskey, Morris and Long. Ways and means, Meeks, Trowbridge and Caskey. Accounts-Willard, Jonas and Kent.

First ballot for president of board resulted as follows: Morris 4, Willard 1, Long 1. The Mayor advised that a purchasing committee was needed whose duty should be to purchase from time to time all supplies for the city except what would come under jurisdiction of the improvement committee. Mr. Caskey moved that a resolution be passed asking the Mayor to appoint said committee. The Mayor conferred the obligation on the ways and means committee.

It was suggested that the ordinance in regard to night policemen be repealed and that office be vacated. A motion to repeal the ordinance resulted in a vote of 4 for and 2 against. Kirksville is now without night police.

Accounts amounting to over \$200.00 were allowed including the account of Electric Light Co. for \$189 for lighting the water works power house from November '94. It was ordered that coal oil lamps be used at the power house and that the electric lights be dispensed with.

Several petitions for street and alley improvement were presented and referred to the improvement committee. An order was made that a grade be furnished property owners on the line of Brown Avenue from Dr. C. E. Still's to Sheriff Rupe's which will be surveyed and graded at the petitioners expense. This will be the only street north and south, west of Main st.

John F. Stark was appointed cemetery commissioner. Kent and Jonas were appointed a committee to see the fire company and get them to volunteer their services until the city gets her finances in better condition.
