JEWELRY HER SPECIALTY.

Mrs. Chadwick Brought Pearls, Rubies, Sapphires, Emeralds, Garnets from Europe by the Peck.

Cleveland, O., Jan. 16.—Investigation into the charge that Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick smuggled large quantities of diamonds, gems and other precious stones into this country has developed the fact that the woman dealt in precious stones to an almost fabulous extent. In order to make a case on the charge of smuggling it was found necessary for the government authorities to trace all the deals for diamonds and jewelry made by Mrs. Chadwick both in this country and Europe. The statement has been made by Collector of Customs Leach that considerably more than \$250,000 worth of jewelry and precious stones handled by Mrs. Chadwick has been traced and positively located. It is added that this great amount of jewelry has been uncovered, with the investigation still incomplete. Of this amount the government is directly interested in about one-third.

The regular custom rate of duty on diamonds and jewelry brought to this country is ten per cent. of the value of the goods. Figuring on this basis, the government authorities expect to realize between \$8,000 and \$10,000. The rest of the proceeds from the sale of any jewelry on which duty has not been paid will be turned over to Mr. Looser to be distributed among the Chadwick creditors. It is simply the truth to say that Mrs. Chadwick handled pearls, rubies, sapphires, emeralds and garnets almost literally by the peck, said a government official. Testimony of experts shows that the woman did not handle anything but the finest articles and there is scarcely a penny's worth of cheap jewelry in the entire lot that has been traced. According to government officials, by far the greater portion of the jewelry is in the hands of innocent persons. The work of informing these people that their claim on the jewelry is to be protested is going on.

WRECKED BY GAS EXPLOSION.

At Garnett, Kan., Two People Were Killed and Several Business Houses Were Demolished or Injured.

Garnett, Kan., Jan. 16.—An explosion of natural gas in the bakery of J. W. Fashing at midnight tumbled the building in ruins and badly wrecked five or six large business blocks on either side and across the street. One person was killed and four persons were injured. The dead is Frank Johnson, and J. W. Fashing was fatally injured.

Garnett has been using natural gas for about a month, and in the Fashing bakery it was for baking, heating and lighting. At midnight there was a terrific roar that awakened every person in town. Investigation developed that the Fashing bakery was practically destroyed, the Blum & Morris meat market, adjoining, the Walter Hunt grocery, the Odd Fellows' block, in which is the Citizens' state bank, and the Avenue hotel, had walls blown out and all the windows demolished, and that across the street the Independent telephone building and the Matt glass building had had the front walls blown out.

To Pay the \$750,000 Fee.

Washington, Jan. 16.—It is expected that a \$750,000 attorneys' fee for services rendered the Choctaw and Chickasaw tribes will be disbursed by the treasury department at once. The firm is Mansfield, Murray & Cornish, of the Indian territory. This amount was allowed by act of congress after Secretary Hitchcock had strenuously opposed the payment of the fee.

Some Slavery There Still.

Manila, Jan. 16.—In his report as civil governor of Moro province Gen. Wood says slave trading has been brought practically to an end throughout the seacoast Moro districts, although he says it undoubtedly continues to some extent between the inland Moros and the savage tribes of the interior.

Will Not Marry Divorced Persons.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 16.—Every Episcopal clergyman in the diocese of Kansas City, embracing 80 churches, has signed an agreement not to solemnize matrimony in any case in which either party has a husband or wife living, who has been divorced for any cause arising after marriage.

Killed Son for Disobeying.

Smithville, Mo., Jan. 16.—E. L. Morrison, a wealthy farmer 12 miles east of here, shot and killed his son. Mr. Morrison told him to go and feed the cattle. The boy did not obey at once and the father told him if he could not do it, he would fix him so he could not do anything.

Failed in His Examinations.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 16.—E. K. Brown, the young man found dying by a policeman was later identified as a student from Kansas university. It is believed he was despondent because he had failed to pass several examinations at the university.
