Would Develop Coal Fields.

An enthusiastic mass meeting in the interest of securing the extension of the interurban railway from Kirksville to Unionville and possibly north to Seymour, Ia., was addressed by Frank Funk of Shelby county, promoter of the Hannibal & Kirksville interurban railway. Farmers living along the proposed route for many miles were present. The line from Kirksville to Unionville would open up one of the richest and most extensive coal fields in the state, now wholly undeveloped. The Unionville Commercial club has taken up the project and is directing its energy to the securing of the extension. Several railroad surveys have been run through here by various interests, but the route over which it is proposed to construct the interurban line is declared the most feasible yet proposed.

Road Draggers at a Dinner.

The commercial club of Harrisonville gave a dinner to 192 enterprising farmers in appreciation of their efforts to keep the roads in condition by dragging them. D. Ward King, the inventor of the road drag; Curtis Hill, the state highway engineer, and "Rock Roads" Simmons, the big tobacco grower of Raymore, whose hobby is rock roads, and a number of Butler business men attended. W. H. Scruggs, president of the commercial club, presided. R. S. Woodridge, vice-president of the Bank of Harrisonville, originated the plan for this entertainment and the result will doubtless be the organization of local road draggers' clubs throughout the county, one main object being to connect all towns in Cass county with well graded, well drained, well dragged roads.

State Militia at U. of M.

A Columbia company of the Missouri National Guards will be mustered into service by Captain Paul Hunt, or Adjutant Frank M. Rumbold of Jefferson City. The company has seventy-five men enrolled. It will consist largely of University of Missouri students, who live in Boone county. The company will be assisted in drilling and maneuver exercises by Captain Herschel Tapes of the U. S. A., who is commandant of cadets at the University of Missouri.

Would Relieve St. Joseph.

Senator Stone has offered an amendment to the Rivers and Harbors bill which was sent to the committee on commerce. The bill as it came from the house provided an appropriation of \$75,000 to improve the Missouri river at St. Joseph, provided St. Joseph shall furnish a like amount. Stone's amendment provides that the government shall appropriate the entire \$150,000.

Teacher-Farmer a Suicide.

Tom McKelvey, a prominent Jasper county teacher-farmer, cut his throat at his home, seven miles southeast of Carthage. He recently sold his farm for \$65 an acre, but decided that the price was too low and had brooded over the fact until his mind had become deranged.

He'll Manage the Columbia Herald.

Elihu R. Childers has bought an interest in the Columbia Herald Newspaper company and will become business manager of the paper. He is a son of H. F. Childers, editor of the Troy Free Press and ex-president of the Missouri Press association.

Increase Signal Corps.

The signal corps of the Missouri National Guard in Kansas City will be increased from 35 to 100 men. Capt. C. W. Sass and Lieut. Ruby D. Garfett have received such authority from General Clark of the National Guard.

Capt. Atwood Dies.

Capt. Samuel N. Atwood, the oldest person in Barry county, and probably in southwest Missouri, died at his home near Exeter, aged 100 years. Mr. Atwood was born in 1810, near London, England. He was present when Queen Victoria was coronated. When 30 years old Mr. Atwood came to America and spent a number of years as sailor on the Great Lakes, and finally was promoted to captain of a steamer, which position he held until a few years ago, when he came to Exeter, and has been engaged in fruit growing. He was a personal friend of Abraham Lincoln, William McKinley and Marcus A. Hanna.

Will Prosecute Greeks.

The police at St. Joseph threw out the drag net and brought in all idle or strange Greeks. Numerous crimes are traced to Greeks there, many of whom have been chased out of Omaha, Des Moines and other cities. It is claimed that the Greeks engage in business, establish a credit and close up after swindling wholesale houses out of thousands of dollars.
