The Governor's Corn Exhibit

Governor Herbert S. Hadley will contest with other corn growers of Missouri at the tenth annual state fair to be held at Sedalia October 1 to 7. Missouri has many successful corn growers, and there will be a great show of this, one of the state's foremost products, but none of the exhibits are likely to attract more attention than that of Governor Hadley's, not because of the fact that he is Missouri's chief executive, but because he raised the corn on his Cole county farm, the crop this year paying for the land, and was the first crop ever produced on this tract, which was a little over a year ago, timber land.

Governor Hadley is very proud of his success as a corn grower, and it will be his delight to enter into competition with the corn growers of Missouri at the great state fair.

The agriculture exhibit promises to be one of the best ever seen here, and it will be a great attraction, and one that will interest every farmer, no matter how far advanced he is in the science of farming, to go over this exhibit, and it is to be hoped that every reader of the BLADE who possibly can do so, will visit the state fair at Sedalia and go through the agricultural building.

Now on this 22nd day of September, 1910, comes the above named plaintiff, by his attorney, O. F. Libby, before the undersigned Clerk of the Linn County Circuit Court in vacation and files his petition duly certified under oath and says that he is the absolute owner in fee of all the north half of the northwest quarter and the north half of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of Section No. Thirty-two (32), all in Township No. Fifty-seven (57) north, Range (20) T. Range (20) west of Linn county, Missouri; that he holds and occupied such lands by deeds of general warranty duly recorded in Linn county, Missouri; that plaintiff and those under whom he claims have been in the exclusive occupancy of all such land claiming title and ownership for more than thirty years last past;

That there are clouds appearing on plaintiff's record title in this, that no wife joins in the grant made by Henry Grifty to David Jones and from David Jones to John Crow; that the unknown wife or widow of Henry Grifty, David Jones, John Crow, James Sexton, William Ashley, are made defendants and that said persons are alleged to have no title to such land; that there are other clouds on the record title, viz.: one in the name of William M. Chick and also one in the name of L. T. Foreman and W. L. Hobbs and also in the name of Josephine Collins and also the name of Allice L. Trimble, all of which several claims are void and barred by the statute of limitations; that all such persons, their heirs, devisees or persons claiming as consorts, heirs, devisees, alienees, immediate, mesne or remote, voluntary or involuntary grantees of such persons are made defendants whether their names are herein inserted or not because they are unknown.
