THE MISSOURI LEGISLATURE

BOTH HOUSES GRINDING AWAY AT LAW MAKING.

Bills Offered by the Different Members and What is Done With Them.

Jefferson City.—The senate voted 22 to 8 to engross Senator Busby's measure making the possession of a government license to sell intoxicants prima facie evidence in prosecutions that the holder of the license is engaged in the sale of liquor.

Representative Gossett's bill to make it a misdemeanor to talk about the solvency of a bank and unjustly start a run by saying the bank is in danger when it is not, passed the house.

The Democrats will offer a plan for giving St. Louis, Kansas City and St. Joseph home rule bills, which they say will be fair to all and really do what is intended for them, turn police, election and excise affairs over to the cities.

Bills passed by the house include those permitting seining in the Mississippi and Missouri river at certain times.

New bills provide for four branch agricultural schools in the state and require railroads to incorporate under Missouri laws to exercise the right of eminent domain.

By Senator Busby of Carroll—Prohibiting corporations from exercising the right of eminent domain in this state and providing that before any public service corporation can condemn property or commissioners be appointed for this purpose it must either be incorporated as a domestic corporation or licensed as a foreign corporation to do business in this state.

Jefferson City, Missouri.—Senator Greene of Kansas City introduced a bill in the senate establishing a municipal court in Kansas City. He said that the measure, which is the one that was prepared by the Kansas City Bar association some time ago, was introduced at the request of that organization. He received the bill several days ago.

Women lost a chance to participate in educational affairs in Missouri when the house committee reported adversely the bill allowing women to be members of school boards.

These other bills were introduced: To make it a felony for any political organization or person interested in election to hire political workers.

Providing for arbitration of claims for accident insurance when the insured and the company cannot agree on the amount.

A bank guaranty bill on the Oklahoma plan was introduced. It provides that 5 per cent of the capital stocks of banks shall be held in the state treasury to meet losses.

Jefferson City, Mo.—The house, by unanimous vote, passed a bill by Claiborne of St. Joseph providing that the railroad commissioners shall have power to compel railroads to place automatic signals at all dangerous crossings in the state. It provides for an alarm bell which rings when a train is approaching.

After nearly two hours of dispute the senate engrossed Carter's road bill which provides for the distribution of the state road funds among the counties.

Senator McAllister introduced a bill for the election of a bi-partisan board of police commissioners in Kansas City, St. Louis and St. Joseph, the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1911.

These bills were introduced: To authorize the county court of Jackson county to appoint a county auditor at a salary of \$3,000 a year.

Prohibiting the employment of persons under age in any brewery, distillery or other place where intoxicants are bottled, rectified or handled.

Jefferson City, Mo.—The senate met in the circuit court room. The room is large and senators, clerks, house members and spectators sat together in an irregular body. Jacob F. Gmelch, lieutenant governor, began proceedings by announcing a roll call.

The committees to find meeting places for the two houses of the legislature decided that the senate will meet in the rooms usually occupied by division No. 1 of the supreme court in the new Supreme Court building. It has nearly as much room as the old senate chamber. The house committee decided that the best place for the large body is St. Peter's hall, a part of the big Roman Catholic church. This room is larger than the theater and is about square in shape, more like the house chamber that was destroyed. Furniture will be sent from St. Louis by express. The intention is that ordinary office chairs and cheap desks shall be used, and when the new building is finished it will be furnished with new furniture.

DEMOCRATS ARE WITH TAFT

A PARTY CAUCUS VOTED FOR CANADIAN AGREEMENT.

They Find That It Reduces the Tariff and Has Tendency to Expand Trade.

Washington, D. C.—Democratic members of the house of representatives met in caucus and approved the Canadian reciprocity agreement by a vote of 90 to 22. A few moments after the vote was announced, on motion of Champ Clark of Missouri, the caucus action was made unanimous.

The 22 who voted against the resolution, it was explained later, were those who had voted for free lumber, etc., and their action in caucus was to make their position consistent. It was said they would vote with the party. The resolution as adopted by the caucus follows:

"Whereas, The Canadian reciprocity agreement negotiated by the reciprocity commission of Canada, and president of the United States, while not formulated in accordance with Democratic platform demands, is a reduction of some of the prohibitive schedules in the Payne tariff law, will tend to expand the trade of the United States in Canada, and is in part a recognition of the principles the Democratic party has contended for in the congress and in its platforms. Therefore, be it

"Resolved, That this caucus indorse the Canadian reciprocity agreement and bind ourselves to vote for a bill carrying it into effect."

The caucus unanimously adopted a resolution by Mr. Cantrill of Kentucky declaring that the caucus believes that every American farmer should have at his disposal "the information of the production and stocks on hand of agricultural products and pledge ourselves to attempt to bring about that end by legislation."

MISSOURI'S LOSS \$1,000,000

The Old State House Had No Insurance as Companies Refused to Take the Risk.

Jefferson City, Mo.—The fire loss is estimated at \$1,000,000. The state had endeavored to get insurance companies to take risks on the old building and its contents, but the companies had refused consistently. Examinations had shown faulty construction of the building. So flimsy were the roofs that not a chance in the world remained for them from the time the first glowing embers fell on the thin sheet iron. Even on the otherwise fireproof wings the roofs were as inadequate as in the oldest portion of the building, and the ceilings in the house and senate fell almost simultaneously a little over an hour after the first flames burst from the dome.

Defeated Rebels in Hayti. Cape Haytien, Hayti.—The rebels have received a crushing defeat and Gen. Cincinnatus Leconte, exminister, who was to have been here, had the rebellion succeeded, has taken refuge in the German consulate here in fear he would be shot to death if captured. Many other consulates are sheltering refugees.

Suppressed Greek Miners. Salt Lake City, Utah.—An armed uprising of Greek coal miners at Kenilworth, Carbon county, Utah, was suppressed after one man had been killed, one fatally wounded and several others slightly hurt by flying bullets.

A Powder Mill Explodes. Ishpeming, Michigan.—An explosion of dynamite at the mills of the Pute Powder company, located three miles south of here killed ten men and seriously injured another.

EXPRESS TO MEXICO REFUSED

Because of the State of War the Wells-Fargo Will Not Accept Shipments.

Kansas City, Mo.—Owing to the state of war existing in northern Mexico the Wells-Fargo Express company is refusing to accept business for that part of the southern republic. The territory which is beyond control is that north of Chihuahua.

Cattle shipments from Mexico which depends upon the railroads south of El Paso have been suspended.

A party of mining investors going out of this city for Guymas will go to Nogales, and then south. This route will take them west of the present theater of activities.

Just a Breath of Freedom. Leavenworth, Kan.—William Wilson, released after having served two years in the federal prison for post-office robbery, was arrested at the prison gate and will be taken to Indianapolis to face a similar charge.


