Premium Fruit

One day at the state fair this year would have warmed the heart of any discouraged Missouri fruit grower. The display demonstrated beyond doubt that Missouri can grow apples and pears equal to the best the West produces. Winners at the fair this year carried off two dollars where they got one last year.

The state board of horticulture got behind the horticulture display this year and made it possible to double the premiums. Although the average fruit grower does not exhibit solely for the money, it makes him feel good to carry home cash as well as ribbons.

All of the premium plates of apples and pears, both first and second, were turned over to Secretary Boles of the state board of horticulture. Each specimen of fruit was double wrapped in paper and marked with grower's name. This fruit will be held in cold storage at Columbia until the 13th of January when it will be unpacked and put on exhibition during Farmer's Week at the university. There are no premiums offered, but the fruit will be exhibited under the grower's name. There are over forty different varieties of the well-known types of apples, and five specimens each of about one hundred other less widely grown varieties. This will make a splendid display of Missouri's best fruit, and will be well worth going across the state to see.
