## INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute, Chicago.)

### LESSON FOR NOVEMBER 10.

#### WORLD'S TEMPERANCE SUNDAY.

**GOLDEN TEXT.**—Hosea 7. "Woe unto them that rise up early in the morning, that they may follow strong drink; that tarry late into the night, till wine inflame them."—Isaiah 5:11.

We turn aside today from studying the life of Christ to consider one of the things that caused the downfall of Ephraim, that is the northern kingdom, and also of Israel, i. e., those who composed the southern kingdom. The chief counterfeit of the Holy Spirit employed by Satan is the inspiration and the intoxication produced in the use of liquors, and we do well to pause and consider the works of him whom Jesus came to destroy. (Heb. 2:14).

The lesson naturally divides itself into two divisions, vv. 1-7 and vv. 8-16. This entire section really begins in chapter six verse four and contains the response of Jehovah to the cry of the remnant of Israel and of Ephraim in the last days. In the first half we see the iniquity of Ephraim and Israel "discovered," i. e., revealed, and in the second section there is discovered or revealed to us God's wrath against them for their hypocrisy.

I. God declares that it was his desire to heal them both, (v. 1). It is not God's will that any should perish. But while Jehovah would have healed them they would not be healed, (cf. Matt. 23:37 and Luke 13:34), and hence it is that his love serves to reveal their wickedness. Dr. Torrey points out eight charges brought against the common people "Ephraim" and the court and city "Samaria," for this evil attacks both alike.

#### Never Hidden From God.

(1) "Falsehood" (v. 1). Nothing is more common among the evils of intemperance than falsehood; as we have suggested it is the Devil's false imitation of true inspiration. (2) "A thief comes in." Intemperance steals not only a man's money but his reputation, love for his family, in fact any and everything a sober man will hold dear. (3) "They consider not in their hearts." Like Rip Van Winkle, men say "this last doesn't count," forgetting that it does count and that God remember all of their wickedness. A violation of his law will receive punishment in due season. America is paying the price of a manifold increase in taxation, in murder, in intemperance, in divorce and suicide, the overwhelming portion of which can be traced to intemperance. God is remembering all our wickedness and verily a troop of rickshaws are stripping us (v. 1).

We oftentimes hide our evil deeds from man but never from God, and a man's sins will find him out (Psalm 9:16). These people made the king glad (v. 3), i. e., the king delighted in this wickedness. Let us not forget that righteousness exalteth a nation and sin is a reproach to any people. (4) "They are all adulterers," (v. 4). Of course in this connection we know there was a remnant of true followers, but the prevailing villainess was such as to call forth this terrific indictment. We need to remember that the connection between the liquor traffic and white slavery is so close as to defy separation.

#### "The Great Destroyer."

A liquor drinker is almost invariably a scoundrel. He scorns the power of liquor over himself, its effect upon the nation. "Sum up the economic loss of efficiency the cost of crime, pauperism, and insanity, and we have an economic burden of more than half of the wealth produced by this nation." (See Congressman H. R. Hobson's, "The Great Destroyer"). (5) "They have made ready their heart like an oven while they lie in wait," (vv. 6, 7), referring undoubtedly to the heat of anger and passion as well as of lust. (7) "They have devoured their judges" (v. 7). One has but to review the pages of history to appreciate the overthrow of priest, peasant and potentate alike. (8) "There is none that calleth upon me" (v. 7). The turning aside from God was noted at the outset, here again we see that the neglect and forgetfulness of God is the true source of all of man's sinning.

II. God intended Israel, and intends us, to be separate people. The prophet sets before us the result of this refusal upon Ephraim. A cake not turned is a cake half baked, one half burned. This metaphor has many applications. Our social life, our political life, our spiritual life is too often one that is half turned, one-half burned to a crisp and the other half raw.

## MISSOURI STATE NEWS

### Two Trainmen Injured.

An eastbound freight train running extra was fatally derailed at a point six miles east of Glasgow as the result of the breaking of an arch beam. Two oil cars and the caboose went into the ditch. Conductor George Thompson jumped and suffered a badly sprained back and severe bruises. Rear brakeman J. F. Tillery, who was in the caboose at the time, suffered slight concussion of the brain and a number of cuts and bruises. The caboose caught fire from an overturned stove and Tillery was taken out unconscious just in time to save him from burning to death. The injured men were taken to their homes in Slater.

### Dumb Woman Disturbed Peace.

Minnie Duncan, a deaf and dumb woman, was adjudged guilty of having disturbed the peace of her neighbors, in the Springfield police court, although she was unable to answer attorney's questions except on paper. The information charged the dumb woman with creating the disturbance by "using loud and offensive conversation."

### Nevada Defeats Franchise.

The proposed waterworks franchise submitted to the voters of Nevada by W. C. Gunn of Fort Scott, Kas., was defeated by 301 votes. Mr. Gunn recently bought the old waterworks plant from the Missouri-Lincoln Trust Company of St. Louis, whose franchise expired several years ago and was asking for a two-year term of operation.

### Gives Milk of Five Cows.

Carlotta Pontiac, owned by the State University at Columbia in the year just ended, produced enough milk to make 829 pounds of butter. That is only 39 pounds less than her mother, Chief Josephine, produced, making Pontiac the second best cow in the state. Pontiac was 7 years old when the test began.

### Summer Course for Clergy.

A summer short course for all the country preachers will be offered at the State University next summer, on the theory that the country preacher has to be a farmer as well as a preacher, a man of ideas, capable of giving advice on temporal as well as spiritual matters.

### State's Bankers Meet.

One hundred and fifty members of the group 11, State Bankers' association, met in annual convention at Springfield. In addition to the bankers from the 15 counties included in the group some 30 bankers from Kansas City, St. Louis and New York City were present.

### Mexico Pastor Resigns.

After serving as pastor of the Methodist church, South six, weeks the Rev. J. Jackson resigned, giving ill health as the cause. Asked if the recent investigation of several members of the church board of stewards had anything to do with the case, Dr. Jackson declined to comment.

### Road Bonds Carry.

A proposition to issue \$20,000 in bonds for the purpose of building rock roads in Center township, of which Nevada is a part, was carried by the close margin of eleven votes. The road to be built is part of the Kansas City-Joplin automobile highway.

### Investment Company Incorporated.

A certificate of incorporation was issued by the secretary of state to the Arnold investment company of Kansas City; capital stock \$5,000.

### Woman Threw Acid.

Mrs. Louise Koeppen, 60 years old, was arrested on a charge of hurling acid in the face of Mrs. Anna Linsburger at Springfield. The women live-long friends, quarreled in Mrs. Koeppen's home. One of Mrs. Linsburger's eyes was seriously injured and her face burned. Mrs. Koeppen gave bond pending a preliminary hearing on a charge of felonious assault.

### Chafin's Nephew Joplin Addressed.

In an audience at Joplin, addressed by Eugene W. Chafin, Prohibition candidate for president, was R. C. Fordham, a nephew of Chafin, who conducts a saloon in Joplin. The relative was one of the most interested hearers of a speech telling why the liquor traffic should be suppressed.

### Sell Old Guard Buttons.

Girls in the five quarters at the State University will sell "old guard buttons" to Tiger followers to realize money to send the cadet band, the yell leaders and the chairman of mass meetings to the Kansas game Thanksgiving.
