### Tuesday's Election

There was a light vote polled in Linn county at last Tuesday's election. The vote in this township was nearly one hundred short. The republicans polled 202 votes, the democrats 154 and the bull moosers 12. In the county the entire democratic ticket was elected except prosecuting attorney, J. H. McKinney, the republican nominee being elected over Alpha Burns, the present incumbent, by 92. The democratic majorities ranged all the way from 200 to 1200.

All amendments were beaten in the state, and the democrats elected their entire state ticket.

### Rural School Meetings

Profs. Page and Capps of the Laclede schools visited four rural school houses last Friday night and made addresses on the subject of annexing rural schools to a central high school. They visited Sunny Point, Oak Arbor, Pleasant Grove and Bruner and at each place found good meetings being held in the interest of school work. The sentiment in favor of annexation is growing among the rural patrons and is now a subject of general discussion.

At the Bruner meeting there were 38 present and the teacher, Miss Pearl Young, was conducting an interesting program. At Sunny Point there were 42 present and much interest being shown in the meeting. Miss Florence Adams is teacher. In the Oak Arbor district there were 90 at the meeting and an unusual amount of interest shown in school matters. Miss Myrtle Harter is teacher. At Pleasant Grove, known as the Barton district, there were 35 present, Miss Minnie Venable being teacher. Good interest was shown. Similar meetings were held at every school house in the county in response to a program given out by State Superintendent Evans.
