

A SLAP AT WILSON

Chicago and St. Louis Election Results Significant

The republican landslide in St. Louis city election Tuesday, which carried every office by almost unprecedented pluralities, was explained Wednesday by both democratic and republican leaders in St. Louis as a desire on the part of the people of all classes to support a republican administration. National republican issues were placed above local issues in the contest, in the opinion of men of both parties.

Mayor Kiel declared the election in St. Louis could well be looked upon as an indication of what will happen at the national election next year. He cited the result of the election in Chicago where a republican mayor and the entire ticket went in by more than a 125,000 majority, to substantiate his comment that "the people generally are anxious to vote against democratic theories."

Samuel Rosenfeld, president of the democratic business men's conference, which selected the democratic candidates for board of aldermen in St. Louis, in discussing the defeat of all the democrats on the ticket, said:

"Tuesday's elections mean nothing more nor less than that the people voted on national political issues and disregarded any local issues in municipal government. It was simply a vote for the republican party. If that is what the people want, then they should be permitted to have it. I believe I am absolutely correct when I say the election was a vote on national issues."
