County Callings

The February term of the Linn county circuit court at Brookfield convenes on Monday, the 16th.

The Traverse furniture stock at Linneus has been sold to C. V. Gibson of Hardin, the new owner taking charge last week.

During 1919 there were 105 births and 67 deaths in Marceline, 17 less births and 28 less deaths than in 1918. In Chillicothe death beat the stork by 18.

S. M. Strain, has moved his Hallmark Store at Brookfield to the corner room in the new Frances block where he invites his friends from this part of the county to call on him when in Brookfield.

A special election will be held in Brookfield next Tuesday to vote \$18,000 in school bonds, that amount being needed in addition to the \$75,000 voted last year for a central school building.

Miss Martha Lander of Brookfield has been appointed deputy circuit clerk to succeed C. B. Burns, the appointment being made by Judge Fred Lamb. Miss Lander will have charge of the Brookfield office.

Funds are being raised at Brownings to erect a memorial monument, not alone to the boys from Brownings who lost their lives, but to represent every boy from that vicinity who took part in the great world war.

Meadville's fourth annual short court in agriculture will be held on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of next week. E. M. Harmon, specialist in dairying, will be there Friday and D. A. Spencer will be present two days and discuss animal husbandry. County Agent Nichols will give a short talk each day.

Morton G. Kendrick, a pioneer citizen, died at his home in Marceline on Thursday night of last week at the age 87 years. He was the father of the well known attorney, C. M. Kendrick and Mrs. Viola I. Webster, wife of Harry Webster of the Marceline Herald. Funeral services were held at the late residence Saturday afternoon.
