

### Small Vote Polled

As was generally expected a small vote was polled in this county at the state primary held Tuesday, only about 25 per cent of the vote being out and the same per cent prevailed throughout the state. The high man on the republican ticket in this precinct got 74 votes and the democrats polled 39.

Following is the republican vote: For senator, Spencer, 47; Davis, 9; Minnis, 7.

For governor, Hyde, 64; Mc-Jimsey, 2.

Lieutenant governor, Elvins, 38; Lloyd, 25.

Secretary of state, Harrison, 27; Austin, 16; Becker, 16.

State auditor, Hackmann, 45; Phillips, 15.

State treasurer, Viles, 42; Thompson, 20.

Attorney general, Dow, 19; Barrett, 15; O'Fallon, 16; Kimbrell, 14.

The vote was divided about even for judges of the supreme court.

Robert McCollum, for representative; C. K. Hart, for prosecuting attorney; Edward Powell, for sheriff; and John Carlon, for treasurer, had no opposition and received the full vote.

Carl F. Sayles was elected committeeman for this township.

On the democratic ticket the vote was, for senator: Long, 22; Lindsey, 11; Hay, 5. Preist, the avowed wet candidate, did not get a vote in this precinct.

For governor, Atkinson, 17; Mayer, 15; Farris, 5; Merryman, 2.

Lieutenant governor, McClintic, 22; Buford, 9.

For secretary of state, John L. Sullivan had no opposition.

For treasurer, attorney general, and judges of the supreme court, there was no particular interest here and the vote was divided about even among the several candidates.

For prosecuting attorney, Burns, 11; Harry West, 26.

For sheriff, Richardson, 23; Williams, 14.

### Here and There

As a result of the railroad rate increase authorized by the interstate commerce commission, it is asserted there will be a hike of from 75 cents to \$1.35 per ton on coal.

A ruling by the state public service commission given out Wednesday grants the increase of rates for electric service asked for by the Brookfield Electric Light Company. The increase becomes effective August 15, to run for a period of thirteen months.

The coal shortage, which has been looming as a vital certainty this winter, has assumed a much less serious proportion since the Illinois miners returned to work Monday. Fuel dealers that have been "viewing with alarm," are now a little more optimistic and believe they will soon be able to fill orders that have been piling up. Everybody is anxious to get in their winter supply, remembering what a shortage there was of fuel last winter. There is much Illinois coal used in Laclede and a resumption of work at the mines is calculated to start the supply this way soon.

Seven distinct lines of study will be offered this coming year by the college of agriculture of the university of Missouri, which has just issued its annual descriptive bulletin. Outlined in this bulletin, for which application should be made to the registrar of the University, are a four-year course in agriculture for men, a four-year course in agriculture and home economics for women, a four-year course for the training of teachers of vocational agriculture, a two-year winter course in agriculture, a short course in home economics, a course in dairy manufactures, and the usual farmers' short course in agriculture known as Farmers' Week.



## Will Open Monday, September 6.



The school board is glad to be able to announce to the district patrons and surrounding community that they have secured experienced teachers and the school for the ensuing year will remain on the First Class Fully Accredited List. This has not been done without an increase in expense, as experienced high school teachers are scarce and salaries materially raised.

It will cost about \$1,400.00 more to operate the school this year over last year. The Board believes, however, that the people of the district would rather meet this additional expense than have the schools go back to 2nd or 3rd class as many schools in the state are doing.

So we invite non-resident students to enroll in our school, feeling we can offer them educational advantages better, or at least equal to any first class school.

The Board has adopted the following schedule of rates for non-resident students:

Primary department, \$2.00 per month.  
Grades, \$3.00 per month.  
High School, \$5.00 per month.

Tuition payable quarterly in advance. All students moving into the district, living with relatives, or boarding, just for the purpose of attending school, are classified as non-residents and must pay the regular tuition. Grades will not be given students whose tuition is unpaid.

Those seeking a good high school are invited to confer with the Superintendent, Miss Minnie Trippeer, as to what our school has to offer.
