## Harding and Coolidge

## Republican House and Senate

The next house will be republican by at least fifty-three majority and the next senate will be republican by at least ten majority," declared representative Simeon D. Fess, of Ohio, chairman of the national republican congressional committee, after the results in Maine and the subsequent state primaries had been announced.

The basis for the statement of Chairman Fess that the senate will be republican is not far to seek. The present republican majority in that body is two. With Weller succeeding Smith in Maryland the majority will be increased to four, with Ernst defeating Beckham in Kentucky it will be increased to six, with Shortridge defeating Phelan in California it will be eight, and with Gooding defeating Nugent in Idaho it will be ten. In addition Johnson, a democrat, is certain to be superceded by Norbeck, a republican, in South Dakota. Willis will hold Ohio in line and the plurality of 175,000 in the primaries in New York assure his re-election. If Chamberlain should be defeated in Oregon the majority would be fourteen.

## Harding Commands Respect

The reception given Senator Harding when he spoke to the farmers at the Minnesota state fair leaves no room for doubt as to the esteem in which the republican candidate is held by the agricultural interests of the country. The senator's address

was a serious, dignified discussion of agricultural conditions at the present time, with suggested solutions of their problems which he proposes to apply if elected to the presidency. It was an appeal to the intelligence of his auditors, who gave the senator their closest attention and enthusiastic applause when he had finished.

## Fluctuating Prices

Senator Harding fully endorses the promise of the republican party to make a scientific study of prices of farm products for the purpose of reducing abnormal fluctuations. He recognizes the fact that farm prices must go up and down according to whether there is a plentiful crop or a short one, but he says the fluctuations have been altogether too violent, and never so violent as under the present democratic administration. He does not promise any quick remedies. He realizes it is a tremendous problem, and he promises to make a thoro study of the disease and then apply the remedy which promises a cure.

## Home Owning vs Divorces

The contention that home owning makes for good citizenship and higher living ideals is corroborated by a recent study of divorce cases in Chicago, where out of 3577 suits for divorce filed in a recent year only seventy couples owned their homes. In 2,171 cases there were no children.

Records show that in Chicago in 1919 there were 37,583 marriages and between 5,000 and 6,000 divorces, an increase in divorces of 20 per cent since 1911. The growth of the apartment habit and extravagance are given as two prominent causes for this increase.

## Clean House at Washington
