## Sudden Passing of John Weatherly

John S. Weatherly died of heartfailure at his home five miles southwest of Laclede Friday, June 10, 1921. He had just returned from a horseback trip to Laclede, during which he bought several head of stock, had put the horse in the barn and started for the house when he fell dead, only a few feet from where his brother, Fletcher, died a few years ago.

John Stafford Weatherly was born in Gilford county, N. Car., March 19, 1856, and came with his parents to this state in 1857. He was united in marriage to Lydia Agnes Hetrick, August 22, 1881. To this union three children were born, Mrs. Eva Shaffer and J. Ray Weatherly of Deer Lodge, Mon., and E. Clyde of Milbank, S. Dak., all of whom survive and were present at the funeral. His wife preceded him to the great beyond August 12, 1920. He is also survived by one grandson, Norton Sullivan, and one niece, Mrs. Laura Logsdon of St. Joseph, who with a large circle of friends mourns his sudden demise.

The deceased lived his entire life on the old home place, farming and dealing in stock, spending more than 60 years in this vicinity, and was probably the oldest pioneer of this part of the state. He had watched this country grow from a fenceless prairie country to its present high state of cultivation, and naturally had a wide acquaintance throughout the state.

Funeral services were held at the Forker church Tuesday afternoon, conducted by Rev. E. L. Robinson of Brookfield, assisted by Rev. E. M. Hoff of Laclede and the remains laid away in the Laclede cemetery by Director Thurman.
