Linn and Neighboring County News Briefly Recorded

The business men of Browning have subscribed the biggest purse in the history of the town for a celebration July 4.

W. A. Chittenden has returned from Beardstown, Ill., to Brookfield and is again superintendent of the Brookfield division of the Burlington.

The city council of Marceline has fixed the city tax levy at 85 cents on the \$100 valuation and the poll tax at \$2 per head to be paid in cash.

Daily Argus:—George Ziehr was injured Monday morning, being knocked down by a car coming out of the Stoddard Garage. The car was driven by Wesley Love, who is employed there. One of Mr. Ziehr's legs was fractured just below the knee.

Summer Star:—There will be something like one hundred acres of pickles planted in this region this year, and as the weather promises to be favorable for raising cucumbers this season, there should be an abundant crop which will mean some good money to those engaged in raising them.

The seventeenth annual session of the Meadville chautauqua will be held August 20-28. The talent is said to be unusually strong this season, among the toplineers being Hon. Webster Davis, a former mayor of Kansas City, and assistant secretary of the interior in President McKinley's cabinet.

James H. Phillips a former citizen of Linneus, was shot and killed by robbers at Portland, Oregon, on Tuesday of last week. He was employed as a railroad detective and when he came upon two men robbing a car he was shot down without warning and died soon after in a hospital. He lived long enough to give a good description of the men and they were captured. The remains were brought to Linneus for burial this week.

James Min Smith, a widely known citizen of Linneus where he had resided many years, died last Saturday white on a fishing trip on Yellow Creek east of Shelby. With his nephew, John D. Mullins, and others he had gone to the creek to fish and when he did not return to the car for lunch at noon a search was made and his dead body was found on the bank of the stream where he had been fishing. He was 74 years old and a brother of Mrs. A. W. Mullins.

Missouri's Population

The 1920 population of Missouri comprised 1,723,319 males and 1,680,736 females, a total of 3,404,055, the Census Bureau announced yesterday. During the decade the total population increased 3.4 per cent, the male population by 2.1 per cent and the female population by 4.7 per cent.

The distribution of the population according to race follows: White, 3,225,044; negro, 178,241; Indian, 171; Chinese, 412 Japanese, 135; all others, 52.

The foreign born white population numbered 186,026 in 1920, as against 228,896 in 1910. This element of the population constituted 5.5 per cent of the total in 1920 as against 7 per cent in 1910.


