The News of Neighboring Towns Briefly Told

The Linneus chautauqua opened Wednesday and will run until next Monday night.

The Meadville chautauqua dates are August 19 to 27. Season tickets are \$2.25 if bought this month and 25 cents higher next month.

Bricklaying was begun Monday on the new memorial hospital at Marceline. The ceremony of laying the corner stone will be held about the middle of August.

The Sante Fe railroad company claims to have coal enough stored at Marceline to run the Missouri division through the winter, but they are not so well fixed on other divisions.

As if Senator Reed didn't already have enough weight hanging to him, the German-American organization has endorsed him, the withdrawal of American troops from Germany and the return to beer and wine being their program.

The Locust Creek Drainage Ditch bonds were sold last week to Wm. R. Compton & Company of St. Louis. The issue amounts to \$325,000 and were sold at 5 1/2 per cent par, \$20,000 down and the rest in monthly installments, allowing 3 per cent interest on daily balance. Work on the ditch will soon be under way.

The period between Armistice Day, November 11, and Thanksgiving Day, November 30, has been designated as the annual membership roll call period of the American Red Cross. Roll call this year will be conducted as in previous years, each chapter being in charge of the work of enrolling members in its own district.

Judging from the make of their cars, they are anything but the "poor, downtrodden vassals of capitalistic greed that have had to work under conditions that were well nigh unbearable, until they were compelled to strike."
