 Himself must either hold or drive."
 TO KEEP RATS FROM HARNESS.
 Almost all persons who have used harness have been more or less annoyed by having them injured by rats. We give a few hints as to how this may be avoided, though everybody knows, or effects to know what is best. The recipes here given are collected from different sources:
 Take about a teaspoonful of Cayenne pepper, mix it thoroughly with a quart of oil, and rub the harness with the mixture. This, it is claimed, will not only keep rats from gnawing the harness, but it will also prevent horses and colts from chewing their lines or halters.
 Take two quarts of green leeks, pour over them one gallon of oil, and let it stand a few days before using; the longer it stands the better.
 A little benzine rubbed over the harness after it has been oiled is said to be a sure preventive, but is not recommended by many, on account of the idea that it injures the leather.
 One ounce of aloes to one gallon of oil will prevent rats from destroying the harness.
 It is also claimed that by mixing a small quantity, say a table spoonful of pine tar to one quart of oil, harness will be most effectually protected from any injury; but if too much is put on the leather will not absorb it. It will collect dirt, besides making the harness unpleasant to handle.—(Harness and Carriage Journal.)

LAND OCCUPIED BY FENCES.
 The materials and labor required to build and keep fences in repair are among the heavy items of farm expense. The cost of the land on which they stand is another item, on which J. Harris, of Rochester, discourses as follows in the *American Agriculturist*:
 How much land "does an old-fashioned fence occupy? I have always thought it took up a good deal of land, but never had the curiosity to measure. But this summer we have been building a stone wall along the whole west side of the farm, and, after it was completed, and the old fence removed, I was surprised at the quantity of land we had gained. The ground, of course, might have been ploughed closer to the fence; but, taking the case as it actually was, the old rail-fence, with stones, weeds, rubbish, &c., occupied a strip of one rod wide. A field thirty-one rods long and thirty-one rods wide containing about six acres. If surrounded by such a fence, it would occupy a little over three-quarters of an acre of land. A farm of one hundred and sixty acres so fenced would have twenty acres of land taken up in this worse than useless manner. Not only is the use of the land lost, but it is, in the majority of cases, a nursery of weeds and, in plowing much time is lost in turning, and the headlands and corners are seldom properly cultivated.
 A MARKET FOR POTATOES.
 The crop of potatoes this year promises to be a large one. To the question, What shall we do with them? "Rural," of the *Chicago Tribune* answers:
 What you cannot sell, feed to your cows, horses and pigs. In the New England States and New York, in the old time, the potato crop had no commercial value, but was of great importance for feeding purposes. Better give our work teams in spring a feed of potatoes at noon, rather than corn, especially if we feed corn at night and morning. If you have a dry cow to fat, feed her potatoes. If short of corn for the pigs, boil potatoes for them. A peck a day to each cow will add to your yield of butter. The surplus for market is more apparent than real, after deducting for home use. Thousands of farmer's families at the West will have a winter supply for the first time, thanks to the potato mania. The Colorado potato bug, that was to sweep away this crop and cut it off from the list of good plants, has disappeared from among us (in Central Illinois), and the potato bids fair to be more valuable than before.
 THE HOP CROP.
 The Green Bay (Wisconsin) *Advocate* says:
 "We gather from our exchanges that the hop crop in this State will be better than last year. In some places it is damaged by lice, but the destruction is confined to limited localities. In some places the picking has commenced, but generally the crop will not be ready for picking until the latter part of this week. At Baraboo and elsewhere growers are uncertain whether the prices will justify the expense of picking and hauling, and unless some assurance is given of remunerative prices, the crop of many yards will be allowed to perish on the vines. At Kilmour City 15 cents per pound have been offered for prime new hops."
