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H. O. G. S. in Denver, Colorado

The following is a letter from a lawyer at Denver and it is taken verbatim from the Labor Journal of that city, we believe we are justified in reprinting it. The facts and conditions mentioned in this letter are said to be about the same in most places where these houses of good (?) shepherds are found:

Denver, Col., Nov. 18, 1913. Editor Labor Journal:

While in Denver on other legal business I took occasion to visit the House of the Good Shepherd where the daughter of one of my clients is imprisoned by virtue of what appears to me to be a fake judgment of the district court of Platte county, Wyoming. I desired to learn at first hand something of the conditions obtaining in the institution in which the authorities in Wyoming commit young girls.

At the House of the Good Shepherd on last Friday, I was received with every courtesy and consideration and was shown through the institution. Two separate and distinct departments are maintained. The girls of the one department are not permitted to come into contact with the girls of the other department. To all intents and purposes there are two institutions, one for innocent girls whose parents are too poor to provide for them, and one for wayward girls. In both departments instruction in the common school branches is supposed to be given, though I saw no evidence of instruction in the latter department. At any rate, the latter is a penal institution, the grounds of which are surrounded with high cement walls, plastered on the top with broken glass. These girls are required to do "convict labor" in a large, well equipped modern laundry which is run on a commercial basis and in competition with the "free labor" of Denver laundries. The girls, of course, receive no pay for their work, and several of the girls in this, by far the larger department of the two, appear to be above the age of twenty-one.

After leaving the House of the Good Shepherd I went to the office of Judge Ben Lindsey of the Juvenile court of
