

Rome Boycotts the Panama Exposition

FOR the second time this season the papist press is in eruption over Ernesto Nathan, Italian delegate to the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco. The man flamed up and died away when the distinguished ex-mayor of the Eternal City was appointed; but the second spasm seems to be more violent, dating from the day the un-afraid and unperturbed English-born Hebrew landed in America on the Italian king's business.

If you wish to start something in the wild ward of a lunatic asylum, just refuse to take seriously the vagaries of its inmates. A similar result followed a similar cause when the whole world, insistently indifferent, failed to frustrate when Rome rated Nathan's appointment as an unforfeitable insult to 'steem million American Catholics. A hundred million yankees are now wondering in a listless sort of way why all these papal philogotsics right at the beginning of a season when everybody is trying to keep cool.

It seems that Nathan and the pope have been neighbors in a way, inasmuch as there was room for both of them in the city of Rome. Although the pope was ruler of heaven, earth and hell, Nathan was elected mayor of the city in a popular uprising against the Holy Father's jurisdiction. While relations between the two were in a strained condition His Holiness said something execrably funny. Unconscious humor is the funniest of all, and popes for centuries have followed the habit of saying things to be laughed at, but with the intention of being very sober and serious.

Now, when the pope got off one of his jokes, Nathan not only smiled, but laughed a horse laugh. And right there he insulted the ruler of the universe, got his name on the index, and lighted the flame of indignation that is burning up the June-time and has blazed into a boycott on the San Francisco Exposition. The Jesuit organ misnamed "America," is preaching the boycott with the fervor of Peter the Hermit; and the lesser lights of Latinate literature join in the responsive refrain like a pack of hydrophobic wolves in a thunderstorm.

The whole pack and passel of pin-headed papists are to stay away from the big show. They are going to put on a show of their own—showing the Frisco show that it can't show with Ernesto Nathan in the ring. The man who laughed at the pope has come half way around the world, but he can't get away from the rebuke that is to include all who give him comfort. And still the American people are singularly indifferent. A large and enthusiastic delegation of leading citizens met the proscribed on his arrival, and rendered hospitality notwithstanding the bull of interdict and excommunication. And Ernesto is going about his king's business the same as though nothing had happened. Wherefore more sore, more roar, more gore and more bore.

The New Order On June 15, 1914, at the Yale law school commencement, at New Haven, Conn. former chief justice of the New York Court of Appeals, and the Democratic candidate for president of the United States, Hon. Alton B. Parker, said:

"It were well if each of you could learn to appreciate fully the purpose and efficiency and beneficence of the constitutional insurance to us and our progeny of the rights and liberties that constitute a priceless heirloom in our national family. 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Another Witness in the Court of Public Opinion Mr. Gregory Mason, a staff correspondent for the Outlook, edited by Rev. Abbott and ex-President Roosevelt, has been reporting things from Mexico quite startling and suggestive of priestly Roman Catholic debauchery and corrupt living. When THE MENACE sent a member of its staff to report the Bonifacio-Spurgeon debate, the Canadian post office officials made their chief objection to THE MENACE because our correspondent quoted the question discussed and some of the arguments offered by Mr. Spurgeon. We wonder if the Outlook will suffer exclusion from the mails in Canada because Mr. Mason tells the readers of the Outlook what is General Villa's attitude toward the Catholic church in general and toward the papal priests in particular. One thing is very certain, THE MENACE is in very good company on this papal question, and another thing is becoming quite plain and generally believed by people who read and are informed that the papal system produces a bad lot of priests. Not all are corrupt, but the system pushes them into sin and deceptive living and promises them immunity from arrest at least through the action of the Mortu Proprio, as published in the "Act Apostolica Sedis."

Well, be that as it may, is the Outlook to be called a filthy, dirty rag because it reports conditions in Mexico as expressed by one who knows? That you may have proof tending to show that THE MENACE is keeping to the level of truth and honorable journalism, we quote what the Outlook (June 6, 1914, p. 305) has to say by its correspondent, Mr. Gregory Mason: Villa is doing his best to remove from his country an old incubus—the Church—which has been the friend of the capitalist aristocracy and the oppressor of the people since the days of the conquistadores. "I believe in God, but not in religion," Villa told me in his little office in the Bank of London building in Torreon. "I have recognized the priests as hypocrites ever since when I was twenty I took part in a drunken orgy with a priest and two women he had ruined. They are all frauds, the priests, and the cloth which is supposed to be a protection; they use to entice the innocent. I shall do what I can to take the Church out of politics, and to open the eyes of the people to the tricks of the thieving priests."

Apparently his programme thus far is successful. The only priest I could find in Torreon was in hiding in the house of a wealthy Irishman. In what respect does the above statement respecting corrupt priesthood and a grafting church differ from what THE MENACE has been saying for three years? Will the Nites of Mob and Murder demand the suppression of The Outlook? Is it nasty because it tells the truth? Is THE MENACE to be abused, cursed, slandered, sacrificed because it has pointed what the whole world knew to be true but was afraid to say it? The awful depths to which the papal church has sunk by reason of its pride, its love of show, its thirst for power and greed of wealth is being uncovered and that which seemed to be unbelievable has become the foulest thing in all the earth, because it covers its crimes with a cloak of religion and is "a whitened sepulchre full of dead men's bones."
