## PAPAL FINANCIER HALED TO COURT

### William Lorimer, Chicago Banker of Senatorial Notoriety, and Fiscal Agent of Papal Princes, Reveals in His Operations Another Means of Making America Roman Catholic

From Chicago Examiner, Oct. 1, 1914.

William Lorimer, former United States Senator, and president of the La Salle Street Trust & Savings Bank, was indicted by the United States grand jury yesterday, charged with the misapplication of funds of the La Salle Street National Bank, forerunner of the wrecked state institution.

The grand jury also indicted J. P. Gallagher, who was Lorimer's partner in the Lorimer-Gallagher Company, on similar charges.

Lorimer's bond was fixed at \$15,000, Gallagher's at \$10,000. The defendants have signified their willingness to appear in court and give bail.

Six instances of misapplication of funds by Lorimer, aided by Gallagher, are charged. In one case the statute of limitations would have become operative tomorrow. The first of the thirty-six counts reads in part:

On October, 10, 1911, William Lorimer did, with intent to defraud, unlawfully and wilfully misapply the sum of \$15,000 without the knowledge and consent of the said banking association or the directors thereof.

And the grand jurors further say that Joseph P. Gallagher, with intent to defraud, aided and abetted the said William Lorimer in this transaction.

**\$20,000 FRAUD CHARGES**

The next count charges misapplication of \$20,000 on December 27, 1911. This money, according to the indictment, was turned over to the Lorimer & Gallagher Company.

Other counts charge false entries were made in the books and false certification of checks and other illegal banking methods are enumerated. Section 5509 of the federal criminal code provides a prison penalty only in event of conviction. The minimum is five years, the maximum ten.

William Lorimer is the gentleman who has distinguished himself by a series of stunts which may be catalogued as follows:

- (1) Broke into the United States Senate by a liberal use of money;
- (2) Ejected from same because too coarse in his crookedness;
- (3) Announced conversion from the errors of Protestantism to faith and membership in the Holy Apostolic Roman Catholic church;
- (4) Became fiscal agent for numerous financial operations of the papal system as head of the Lorimer-Munday string of Chicago banks;
- (5) President of La Salle Street Bank and Trust Company which failed last summer to the grief of depositors;
- (6) Indicted for misapplication of funds entrusted to the care of financial institutions under his control; and the end is not yet.

For several years Mr. Lorimer has been alternately ascending like a rocket and coming down like a stick; and his meteoric career reached the zenith of publicity when his repudiation of Protestantism and espousal of Romanism was heralded abroad in front-page display type by the papist and secular press. Al-

though rejected by the Senate on the charge of crookedness unbecoming a member of that body, he was regarded by the papal publicists as a great catch and an accession redounding to the greater glory of Rome. The extent and quality of the comfort popery is to get from its distinguished proselyte may be more fully and accurately determined when the thirty-six counts upon which he is indicted are threshed out in court. In the meantime the public can profitably study this new phase of frenzied Roman finance in which Mr. Lorimer plays the double role of high priest and horrible example.

The detail of the Lorimer transactions is not yet available; but it was stated by Chicago papers at the time the Lorimer banks suspended that their failure was the direct result of inability to realize on certain securities of Roman Catholic origin, securities with which other banks would have nothing to do but which were taken over by the Lorimer financiers as the basis of large loans. In short, the crash was precipitated by a combination of wildcat banking, wildcat promotion of Roman Catholic enterprises, and wildcat paper connecting the two.

In this connection we are not so much interested in Mr. Lorimer, spectacular and sensational as his career has been, as we are in the financial methods by which the papal system is moving to Romanize American commerce and industry at the same time it schemes to capture and utilize political power. Rome is not only intent on the capture of political power in this country. She is equally intent on the capture of financial and commercial power. While by political ascendancy the pope of Rome can establish his authority; by commercial ascendancy, (the control of American business by papal institutions and individual papists) he can acquire wealth to fill the vat at the Vatican and make him internationally supreme.

In other words, the pope's invasion and attempted conquest of America is moving along economic, as well as political, lines. Popery is injecting itself into the bread and butter question; not only in the small way of provident jobs for papists and boycotting the business of Protestants, but by financing and establishing businesses and industries wholly her own. And how is this done?

First, by acquiring a vast amount of church, school, and charity property. This is done largely by means of money contributed by non-Catholics who think they are helping worthy objects in helping to build Roman Catholic churches, hospitals, schools, and convents.

Second, by bonding or mortgaging such property to raise money with which to finance its commercial operations. On a

million-dollar cathedral enough money can be borrowed to build a flouring mill or a machine shop. Enough can be, and is, borrowed on a parochial school building to buy the equipment for an H. O. G. S. laundry.


Third, by the labor of nuns and monks, of waifs and foundlings, of prisoners committed to holy charities like the H. O. G. S., these enterprises can make a start with cheap labor that gives them a tremendous advantage in the battle for business. And how beautiful and beneficial will it be when, connected with each of Rome's untaxed charities, is a shop where the hungry and unemployed can get three square, or three-cornered, meals and a place to sleep in exchange for a day's work.

It is all religious and charitable; but just the same, the Romish industrial system is making a handsome profit from labor that costs but its keep, utilized in a plant payed for by gullible non-Catholics. The effect of the system, when it gets into general operation, is one that may well make legitimate wage earners, and legitimate wage payers, scratch their heads.

Look the system squarely in the eye, Mr. American; study the inevitable effect of its operations; and you will get the full force of what it means to give money to papal institutions. Mr. Lorimer's bungling his part of the process is of consequence principally in calling attention thereto. He might have failed in financing some other kind of an enterprise; and it is possible that he may come out of his present entanglement without serious consequences to himself; but back of the Lorimer incident is the system which is capitalizing non-Catholic contributions to the end of making America Catholic, absorbing American industry, capturing American commerce, and degrading American labor.

It is of no general consequence whether Lorimer goes to the penitentiary, or is left free to figure himself into greater wealth; but the safety of America, financially, commercially, and industrially, as well as religiously and politically, is jeopardized daily by the gullible who give to this insatiable monster. The pennies of children and the dollars of men, numerous given to this hospital, that convent, and the thousand and one objects of papal begging, aggregate in due time millions and millions of dollars. And these millions of capital form one of the clubs with which popery is to beat Americanism and American civilization back into the savagery of the middle ages.

The way to beat the game is to refuse giving a cent to any papal scheme, no matter what its name or its pretence. There are certainly enough worthy objects of charity to make use of your loose change and surplus.

### A Healthy Sign

A recent action of the Chicago school board shows that people are getting their eyes open and that it is not as easy for the Romanists to pull the wool over the eyes of the public as formerly.

The Knights of Columbus had planned a monster Columbus Day celebration at Jackson Park for the 12th inst., and a member of the order appeared before the committee on school management and requested that the children of the Chicago public schools be invited to attend.

When asked if the celebration could be construed as sectarian, the Knights lied by saying that there was nothing sectarian about it. To put the thing over quietly a member of the committee moved that the resolution adopted in the same connection three years ago be adopted again as the sense of the committee. The motion carried. After adjournment of the committee meeting, Mrs. Ella Flag Young, superintendent of the public schools, looked up the 1911 resolution and found that it dealt with the Knights of Columbus celebration of Columbus day. Here she balked, saying, "I will not send out the invitation. I've had enough people blaming me for religious favoritism in the schools. Let Mr. Larson send out the notices."

Mr. Larson is the secretary of the board and he, too, balked. This shows what public opinion will do when once aroused. The people of Chicago are getting tired of having the public schools made a side show for Rome, and they are not backward in informing the school officials of their views. If the whole country can be waked up in this manner Columbus Day will soon be a thing of the past, and Rome will soon have to conduct her shows without the assistance of the public school pupils.

### Censoring the Public Libraries

The public libraries in the different towns and cities of the country, while supported in various ways, usually look to the public for revenue for maintenance. Usually they are supported by municipal taxation, and being public institutions they should endeavor to supply the public with what they want in the way of reading matter, and especially if that reading matter is legitimate matter and does not cost the library anything.

So far as we have observed this policy holds good except in the case of literature that is displeasing to Roman Catholics, such as The Menace and other patriotic publications, and the fact that these are excluded in a great many cases only shows that what we have said is true, namely, that Rome will either rule or ruin, and owing to her domineering, boycotting, bullying tactics she usually rules.

Hardly a week passes that some library board does not exclude The Menace and write us to stop sending the paper, yet strange to say, we have never heard of a Roman Catholic paper being shut out of a library, and we have never heard of a Protestant who objected to them being placed on the reading tables.

Protestants, as a rule, believe in free speech and a free press, but Catholics believe in neither.

Any one of the Catholic papers in this country is more violent in language and more vitriolic in its condemnation of Protestantism than The Menace is of Romanism, yet the Protestants believe in free speech and a free press and let the matter rest at that, but if The Menace shows up the holy hoodlums starts a rumpus and threatens to start civil war if The Menace is allowed to come to the library.

What is the result?

Why, the weak-kneed Protestant whelps lay down and let Rome suppress free speech, that's the result!
