New York, Feb. 28, 1906.—The Erie Railroad has placed with the American Locomotive Company an order for 23 locomotives, delivery to begin in March. These are to be exact duplicates of the 19 engines received by the Erie during the past six months, and which have proven so successful in passenger service as to warrant their adoption as a standard type. Known all along the line as the 2,500 class. With these tenders carrying 16 tons of coal and 8,000 gallons of water, these largest passenger service locomotives ever constructed, weigh 272,000 pounds each, the weight of the locomotive alone being 230,000 pounds.

Used on the through Chicago and Buffalo trains of from 12 to 15 cars, these engines easily keep a schedule time even when hauling these long trains of the heavy coaches now required for up-to-date passenger service. So satisfactory have they proven in making time, during four months' trial in winter service, that the Erie management decided to have a sufficient number on hand for all emergencies in their fast passenger train service.

UNIQUELY DISTINGUISHED

Mrs. C. F. Latham, of Grant, Wis., has the unique occupation of collecting birds and animals for zoological gardens. Her home has been in that location for 50 years, and she has had some varied and exciting experiences.

A. E. Johnson, of New York, who has been created a knight of the Royal Order of the Dannebrog by the king of Denmark, is the owner of two Swedish newspapers in the United States—the Nordstjernan, of Philadelphia, and the Hemlandet, of this city. He also enjoys the distinction of being a knight of the Swedish Order of Wasa.

Carlton J. Balfour, a blind Kansas City youth of 30, is a musical composer of ability, some of his work having been published. Usually blind persons learn music by ear, but young Balfour has his sister read (not play) the notes for him. He is able to retain the combinations a long time in his mind. He lost his sight through an accident at the age of three years.

Helen Masow, a graduate of the State Institute for the Blind at Berkeley, Cal., is well known in musical circles through her fine voice, and she is now creating much interest because of her participation in athletics. She is an expert skater at the skating rink, besides being an ardent horsewoman, riding through the streets and lanes with as much confidence as her more fortunate sisters.

George J. Copperrnoll, of Carleton, Mich., has lived to attain a distinction given to few men—the celebration of his golden wedding with his second wife. Mr. Copperrnoll is 85 years old and has lived on the same farm for 69 years. He first married in 1845 and his wife died in 1851. In 1853 he was married to his present wife and to-day both are well and hearty.

James Russell, a well-known character about the North end of Boston and a resident of this country for about 60 years, astonished his acquaintances a few days ago by applying for his naturalization papers. He had been supposed for many years that he was a citizen. He came from Scotland when a boy and fought for the south in the civil war, serving under Stonewall Jackson. It has taken all these years to overcome his feeling of antagonism to the union.

Thomas Dinamore, a well-to-do resident of Palermo, Me., gives five dollars to everybody born in that place. The money is deposited in a bank to the child's credit and remains there until the recipient reaches legal majority. Mr. Dinamore was born in Palermo 83 years ago. He went to California in 1848, sailing around Cape Horn, and accumulated a fortune during the gold-hunting craze. In later years he traveled a great deal, finally settling down in the place of his birth.

THE STATE OF OHIO.

The white population of Ohio is equal to about half of the white population of North America, outside of the United States.

Ohio is as big as eight of the smallest states combined. It is less than one-sixth the size of Texas and a little over one-quarter as large as California.

The difference between the highest land in Ohio and the surface of Lake Erie, in elevation above the sea, is almost equal to the height of the four tallest buildings in Cleveland placed on top of one another.

In population relative to area Ohio is about equal to Spain, the average density being somewhat greater in this state. Russia, Norway, Sweden and Turkey have fewer inhabitants in proportion to their extent than Ohio.

No part of Ohio is farther north than central Italy. The southern limits of the state are in the latitude of the extreme southern part of Italy, except the tip of Calabria. Cincinnati is only a little north of Lisbon, Portugal.

About ten per cent. of the people of Ohio live in Cleveland. This city accounts for about 25 per cent. of the foreign-born inhabitants of the state. It has much more than half of certain foreign elements, notably the Bohemians and Hungarians.

Ohio is the seventeenth state in age, the thirty-second in area and the fourth in population. There are only seven states which do not surpass Ohio in the altitude above sea level of the highest point of land within their boundaries. These are Rhode Island, Delaware, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Illinois and Indiana.

Although much smaller than many of the states famous as grain producers, Ohio usually ranks among the first half-dozen in the yield of wheat, corn and oats. It stands as high in apples and is usually fourth or fifth in tobacco. Ohio grows more tobacco than Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Alabama, Missouri, Mississippi, Georgia, South Carolina, Indiana and Pennsylvania all together.



THE FARMING WORLD

NEST WITH RUNS.

Movable Box Which Simplifies the Handling of the Sitting Hen.

For several reasons it is best to keep a brooding hen within the range of her nest instead of being allowed to wander off and perhaps return to some other nest. For the small raiser of poultry a very good form of nests with runs is shown in the drawing. Any

A number can be constructed side by side. Each nest is 15 inches wide and high and the boards should be not less than four feet long. Lath or thin slats can be used as a covering at the top and front, and at the lower edge of the front a board six inches wide is to be made fast. At the back the end is closed solid with boards, and a canopy is constructed with boards, having a lid on hinges so the hens and nests can be gotten at.

Boards are fastened two or three inches from the ground and faced at the front with a narrow strip to hold straw in place and prevent the egg from rolling out. This keeps the nest dry also, and when the whole crate is moved about for sanitary reasons, the nest is not disturbed, says the Orange Judd Farmer. The lid should be covered with tarred paper so as to make it water proof, for the lid, being constructed of several boards, would have cracks large enough in it to let considerable water in during a storm. When it rains it would be well to have an old piece of canvas ready to throw over that part of the run next to the nest so as to shed the water, for a driving rain would sometimes wet a hen and nest.

THE BEES AND CHICKS.

Corner-loading hens are unprofitable. The worst looking hen is very often the best layer.

An ounce of salt is sufficient for the mash for 100 fowls.

Where farming can be pursued with profit, bees may be successfully kept.

Store the honey product in a cool, dry place.

When picking out eggs for hatching purposes choose only perfectly smooth ones of uniform size, neither too large nor too small. Be careful not to let them get chilled.

EASILY MADE NEST.

How Orange Boxes Can Be Made Into a Very Serviceable Nest for Fowls.

Orange boxes can be had for the asking in almost every country and village in the land. Such a box, empty, is shown in Fig. 1.

A lot of these boxes can be made useful in many ways about the farm—one way being shown in Fig. 2. The boxes are placed upon their sides, a narrow strip of the cover being nailed back at one side of the top, as shown. Arranged in tiers upon a board shelf, they form excellent nests for the poultry house. A lot of nests can be made in a few minutes and all can be taken out of doors and cleaned whenever necessary.—Successful Farming.

Farm Accounts.
It is my experience as to the general practice of farmers that very few keep any accounts. I might say that when accounts are kept they generally comprise only the wife's bonnet bills. Just now I am not engaged individually in farming, but if I were I would keep book record of everything. I believe that a man should keep an account of every crop grown as well as the general transactions of the farm. I believe that our systems of farm book-keeping should be very much improved. I would suggest a rendering of a regular expense account and keeping a record of all receipts.

Arid America to Be Productive.
In time the arid sections of the United States will be among the most productive sections, as in those localities the sunshine is about eternal and the soil is rich in mineral food. It needs but water and humus to make it bloom and blossom. Great quantities of water are now going to waste that will ultimately be turned back for the irrigation of the land. Tablelands that are now above the reach of the irrigator will ultimately be reached by the sun and the lateral. That land is capable of enormous productivity.

Makes Hens Lay.
There is no one thing better to make hens lay than fresh bones from the table. If one has no bone cutter, a big stone and an old ax serve a good purpose. Even the biggest, hardest bones can easily be split a few times and then pounded fine enough for the fowls to swallow. But hens are so greedy for this diet that one has to be careful or the hens' heads, as well as the bones, will be cracked.

SHOULD A HORSE BE CLIPPED?

CLIPPING IN THE EARLY SPRING RECOMMENDED BY LEADING VETERINARIANS.

All Thinking Men Readily Recognize Its Advantages.

"A horse is a valuable asset, and should receive the best care possible. He should be well fed, comfortably stabled, carefully groomed and clipped in the early spring. If he receives these attentions he will work well and improve in value. A horse lives under almost ideal conditions. In his wild state he required none of these attentions, for he was able to look out for himself. The domesticated animal, being worked under conditions that are in themselves artificial, must be kept in condition for such work."

The clipping of a horse in the early spring is now conceded by all the leading veterinarians to be an essential to a horse's well being, an essential to his comfort and a comfortable bed to lie on. Farmers in England and France have been clipping their horses for many years, and American farmers are not slow to realize its advantages. A clipped horse dries out rapidly after a hard day's work, and will rest comfortably and be refreshed for the work the following day. An unclipped horse is liable to catch the heaves, pneumonia and all sorts of colds, rheumatism, etc. More especially is this so in the early spring, when his hair is long and he is "soft." If worked hard he will perspire freely and the moisture will be held by his long hair, and the food that should go to nourish him will be used to replenish the heat that is being constantly taken from his body by the mass of cold wet hair. If clipped, the perspiration will evaporate almost as soon as secreted, and when put in the stable he rests comfortably and his food does him good.

Some years ago a Buffalo street car company tested the value of clipping in the following manner: They owned 500 horses, and 250 of these were clipped early in the spring and 250 were not clipped. A careful record was kept of results, and it was found that of the 250 unclipped horses 153 were afflicted with coughs and pneumonia, while of the 250 clipped not one case of sickness was reported.

A man would not expect to enjoy very good health if he did hard manual work clothed with heavy underwear, a heavy suit and a fur overcoat, and after perspiring freely, as he naturally would, go to sleep without removing same. It is just as ridiculous to expect a horse to be in perfect health if worked under the same conditions.

If you would get the best returns from your investment in your horse, treat him right, and be sure and clip him in the early spring. A first-class horse-clipping machine can be bought at almost any hardware store for less than \$7.00.—Horse Review, Dec. 5th, 1905.
