NEWS OF THE WEEK FROM OVER WORLD

HAPPENINGS IN OUR OWN AND OTHER COUNTRIES BRIEFLY TOLD.

SHORT ITEMS FOR BUSY MEN

Week's News Condensations Reviewed Without Comment—All Nations Find Something to Edify and Instruct.

Fearing punishment because they had played hooky, Toney Delay and Dominick Antonacci, each 11 years old, of Riverton, Ill., kept secret for a day the fact that their playmate, Jack Janessee, had fallen through thin ice in Mud lake, near Riverton.

The entire bonded indebtedness of Indiana will be liquidated within a few days, according to plans of the state board of finance.

A Harlequin duck, on one leg of which is a metal tag bearing the words "22, Berlin Zoo," was killed near Heaven, Ok.

President Wilson was asked to set aside a day as a Jewish relief day, on which contributions should be raised for suffering Jews in the war zone.

Miss Catherine Goggin, secretary of the Chicago Teachers' federation, was accidentally killed by an automobile truck.

Congressman Frank Buchanan of Illinois, indicted on charges of conspiracy to foment strikes in munitions plants, has surrendered, was arraigned, pleaded not guilty and was released on bond.

Arch Eckersall, his wife and four children were burned to death in a fire which destroyed their home at Salmon, Idaho.

A wage increase approximating 5 per cent will go into effect in the Lockwood cotton mills at Waterville, Me., Jan. 17.

Fire destroyed the plant of the Texas Oil company, at North Birmingham, Ala., causing a loss estimated at \$250,000.

The national prohibition convention will be held at the Auditorium in St. Paul June 19, instead of at Minneapolis, the place originally set by the national executive committee at Chicago.

Miss Anna Franklin of Paris, Ill., inserted an ad in a matrimonial paper for the right kind of a man and a wealthy Michigan farmer seemed to fit the bill, as she married him at first sight.

Mr. and Mrs. James Hepburn were buried at Greenville, Ill., in one grave. The Hepburn, who was 77 years old, died on Saturday evening and Mrs. Hepburn, 75, died Monday.

William Durst, 76, said to be the sole survivor of the crew of the Monitor, which engaged the Merrimack in the historic battle at Hampton Roads, is dead at Philadelphia of pneumonia.

The will of the late Thomas L. Shevlin of Minneapolis has been filed for probate. The entire estate of \$2,000,000 is left to the widow and two children.

Henry Ford has returned to Detroit, but he avoided a delegation of citizens who had planned to welcome him and present him with a floral piece.

W. W. Venable, Democrat, has a comfortable lead over his five opponents in the special election of Tuesday in the Fifth Mississippi congressional district for a successor to the late Representative Samuel A. Witherspoon.

The board of army engineers in a report to congress recommends the improvement of the Missouri river from Kansas City to the Mississippi. The project calls for a total appropriation of about \$20,000,000.

Under the terms of the will of Tommaso Salvini, the actor, who died at Rome, sums ranging from \$1,000 to \$4,000 are bequeathed to institutions of charity and art of Florence.

Hundreds of popular periodicals have been withdrawn from news stands at Spokane, Wash., because of the statewide prohibition law forbidding the advertising of liquors.

Ed. G. H. Buchenau, prominent Syracuse (N. Y.) man, shot and killed his mother while suffering from a fit of religious mania. He was a bit Sunday "trall hitter."

Increases in wages ranging from 2 to 5 cents an hour for Boston longshoremen become effective Jan. 1.

An indictment has been found against Samuel H. Cunningham, who in fumigating the Cordova apartment house at Washington is alleged to have caused the death of Miss Louise Roberts.

Prof. Frederick Kraus of Berlin and Prof. Eisselberg of Vienna announce that King Constantine's condition was most satisfactory.

Because of the increasing activity of Austro-German submarines in the Mediterranean, Lloyds has tripled the usual rates of insurance for ships taking the Mediterranean and Suez canal routes.

Notes of wage increases of 5 per cent affecting 775,000 employees were posted in cotton mills in various cities of northern New England.

A. K. Patterson of Sale City, Ga., was shot by a friend named Strickland, following a quarrel over a dog.

The fourth trial of Dr. E. Clark Hyde, charged with murdering Col. Thomas H. Swapp, a Kansas City millionaire philanthropist, was postponed.

Gen. Victoriano Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, was operated on for gall stones. It is declared that Gen. Huerta may be suffering from cancer of the bladder.

Col. Robert Thompson Van Horn, 91, founder of the Kansas City Journal and pioneer journalist and statesman of the middle west, is dead at his home.

Dr. Helen Nolen, who has been working in the American hospital at Nice, said more than 40,000 allied soldiers had been made blind since the war began.

James Donnelly, a former dry goods clerk in St. Johns, N. K., is the war hero of the colony. At the Dardanelles he acquitted himself so well that King George awarded the military cross to him.

Prohibition won in the local option election in Liberty county, Tex., which gave the drys a majority of 48 in a total of 413 votes.

B. W. A. Henson, a retired farmer near Wichita, Kan., was arrested on a charge of slaying his wife and his son who went to his mother's assistance when she was attacked.

Six negroes met death at Blakely, Ga., at the hands of a posse which was trying to arrest them for the alleged murder of a plantation owner last week.

Harry P. Connolly, 28 years old, of New Orleans, held up a negro at the point of a flask of whisky, but was interrupted by a patrolman, who took him in custody.

Designs prepared by the navy department for two sea-going submarines authorized by the last naval appropriation act contemplate the use of steam turbines in surface propulsion.

A decree establishing a minimum wage of \$5.50 per week for 10,000 women and girls employed in retail stores in Massachusetts has gone into effect.

Ten thousand persons gathered at the Trenton station to welcome Billy Sunday, evangelist, who has begun a seven weeks' campaign in a huge tabernacle.

Frederick J. Clarke, a clerk in the branch of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, at Admiral Sockatchew, is under arrest on a charge of theft of \$600 of the bank's funds.

Henry A. Muesel, a millionaire owner of the Muesel Brewing company, and Frank Chobot, an employee, were murdered and Mr. Muesel's two sons seriously wounded when they resisted the efforts of two bandits to rob the office of the brewery at South Bend, Ind.

Al Ringling, 66 years old, is dead of Bright's disease. Ringling was the oldest of the Ringling brothers, circus owners.

Because Thomas A. Edison's 1916 auto license tag had not arrived, Mrs. Edison is to have a hearing in police court.

Mrs. Evelyn Serill of Chicago put her husband's union suit on the radiator and the buttons got hot. Divorced.

Maj. Frank Holsinger, 60, Kansas pioneer, a leader in the prohibition movement, is dead. He was the prohibition nominee for governor of Kansas in 1900.

Gold valued at \$98,891,100 was produced during 1915 in the United States.

Mrs. H. L. Snyder of New York had to sell her Ferguson dogs for money to live while her husband made a fishing trip to Thousand Islands with an actress.

Delirious from ill health, Mrs. W. O. Collins, 40 years old, of Cleveland, O., shot and seriously wounded her husband and then committed suicide.

One man was killed, five injured and the lives of 60 guests endangered in a fire which destroyed the Hotel Connecticut at Waterbury, Conn. The loss was \$100,000.

The government of Peru has requested the senate to sanction negotiations of a loan of \$15,000,000 to be issued at a price not lower than 88.

Cold and hungry, Harvey Seals, who escaped from the Christian county, Mo., jail with Frank Kosmato, returned and gave himself up to Sheriff John Turner.

Two Austrian torpedo boat destroyers have been sunk in the Adriatic by the naval forces of the allies in those waters.

Tom Ames of East St. Louis and Chicago, a bridegroom of 24 hours, is in jail on a charge of perjury in connection with procuring a license to marry Ethel Stone, 17.

Transatlantic cable communication has been crippled or delayed by severe storms which have swept over Ireland, England and the continent.

The population of Massachusetts was 2,693,316, according to the official announcement of the state bureau of statistics.

Arrangement of Thomas Mott Osborne, whose resignation as warden of Sing Sing prison followed his indictment by the Westchester grand jury, has been postponed.

A Cairo dispatch says that the jewels of the maharajah of Kurnpatala, valued at \$4,000,000, were lost on board the steamer Persia.

Mrs. Paolina Pellegrin, who swore she never tasted water, but always drank wine when she thirsted, is dead at San Michele, Italy, aged 117 years.

CONSCRIPTION WINS IN BRITISH HOUSE

MEASURE PASSES ON FIRST READING BY VOTE OF 403 TO 105.

BALFOUR'S SPEECH WINS DAY

Commons Wild With Enthusiasm and Premier Asquith Resolves Full Indorsement—Abstract Theories Abandoned.

London—Amid scenes of wild enthusiasm, the house of commons passed the first reading of the government bill for compulsory military service by the decisive vote of 403 to 105.

The vote came with the milleries again packed, every seat on the floor of the house occupied, the ministerial benches filled and an air of eager expectancy prevailing.

Throughout these developments outside parliament, the debate in the house had forced steadily ahead, but had been largely to lesser figures.

It was reserved for A. J. Balfour, first lord of the admiralty, to close the debate in behalf of the government, and he did it in a persuasive appeal of half an hour, which aroused the lazing spirits of the advocates of the bill and turned the tide of adversity which had been running steadily against the measure through the debate.

"Let this vote show that we are a united people," was his closing appeal. "Do not let us give a false impression to the world that in the moment of the country's greatest emergency we are divided one against another. Abandon your abstract theories and remember we are dealing with stern realities which call for great sacrifices."

Then came the vote, which was taken amid eager interest as the members filed before the tellers and peers crowded to their galleries to witness the final result. The announcement of the figures was received with a tremendous outburst of cheering.

Amid the demonstration Premier Asquith, his face, usually pale, now glowing with satisfaction, walked down the floor of the house to present the bill formally to the chamber.

His appearance was the signal for an ovation, members of all sides standing and cheering, while the galleries could with difficulty be restrained from joining in the enthusiasm.

LABOR FIGHTS CONSCRIPTION Trades Congress in London Denounces Plan and Demands Its Withdrawal.

London.—On the same day the British parliament passed the conscription bill, the labor congress, England's trade federation went on record against the bill introduced, recommending that the Labor members in parliament oppose the bill at all stages.

By a vote of 1,998,000 against 733,000 the Labor Congress decided to support a demand for the withdrawal of the compulsory bill from parliament.

Pinkerton Dead. Chicago.—Matthew W. Pinkerton, for 34 years head of the Pinkerton United States Detective Agency, is dead at his home here. He was born at Mount Eaton, Ohio, in 1852.

Ex-slaves Married 50 Years. Bristol, Pa.—Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Allen of Bridgewater, former negro slaves, celebrated their golden wedding. They have lived 40 years in their present homestead.

Highwaymen Knock Out 2 Teeth. Chicago.—Chicago highwaymen refuse to be joked with. Hartman Stockingham, after handing over his watch had two teeth knocked out when he reminded the bandits they had overlooked a baggage check.

Chinese Mutineers Arrested. New York.—Eleven Chinese members of the crew of the British freight steamer Veturia mutinied at the dock at Hoboken, and drove the chief officer from the ship. Police put the mutineers under arrest.

Terre Haute Judge Debarred. Terre Haute, Ind.—Elm H. Redman, who served several months in prison following his conviction in the election fraud cases of 1914, was formally disbarred from the court in which he once presided.

Special Session in California. Sacramento, Cal.—A special session of the California legislature convened in response to the call of Gov. Hiram W. Johnson, which specified that the purpose of the session was to readjust the state election laws.

Tick From Bat's Eye Needed. San Antonio, Tex.—In need of a tick from the eye of a bat for scientific investigation, the British Museum has placed an order for the specimen with the San Antonio Municipal Bat Boast.

One Killed in Strike Fight. Hamilton, O.—One man was killed and two others seriously wounded in a fight between strike sympathizers and nonunion molders here. The trouble occurred at the Hamilton Foundry.

Bequests for School and Churches. Marlin, Tex.—Ten thousand dollars to the public schools of this city and \$2,000 to each of the churches here were among the bequests made in a will of B. C. Clark, banker.

Husband Seared Legs. Egg Harbor, N. J.—Mrs. Ella Henderson, 20 years old, mother of three children, had her husband arrested, complaining he burned her legs with hot coals, hung her up by the thumbs and broke her shoulders and broomsticks beating her.
