**Teachers Are You Interested.**  
 House Bill 111, and the amendment to House Bill 218, seek to abolish Normal diplomas as State certificates. Every public school teacher in Saline Co. should raise a protest at once against such unfriendly legislation; the teacher who has taken a thorough course in a training school certainly should enjoy the same privileges for his special efforts as the lawyer who has passed through a law school; or the physician who receives a diploma. The teachers case is certainly not an exception, for none, but the progressive will be able to remain in the ranks.  
 For Missouri to make such a move at this time would be to take a backward step in her onward march to educational supremacy. Many States in the east with three or four times as many normal schools cannot meet the exigencies of the times in furnishing trained teachers. In many of the British provinces certificates are issued for life or during good behavior. We as teachers, having the welfare of Missouri schools at heart, should protest an legislation and urge our Representatives the Hon. W. W. Hall and Hon Robert Smith, to use their vote and influence for the defeat of the above bill. Teachers do not delay in this matter but act at once! Drop a card or letter to your Representative urging him to vote against such a measure which strikes at the heart of the teaching profession. No calling is more honorable and but few more arduous than that of training the immortal mind.  
 Should not the students of our State Normals be entitled to receive, as they do receive under the present law, at the hands of the State the same considerations as that accorded to the graduates of our university?
