Carrollton Coal Company.

We learn that a strong company has been formed at Carrollton for the purpose of developing the coal fields on the north side of the river,

opposite Waverly. To this end the company we learn, has secured a coal lease on all the territory from the river to Bowdry's lake. They have also put up \$2,500 for the purpose of prospecting and preliminary expenses. The intention is to locate a shaft near the river, to which an electric line will be extended from Carrollton. Work has already commenced and a representative of the company reported Tuesday that a depth of 30 feet had been reached.—Waverly Times.
