

**Monday Club**

There was the usual large audience at the meeting of the Fiction class of the Monday club last Monday afternoon. In response to roll call many clever and witty anecdotes of notable women were told. The earlier portion of the afternoon was devoted to the business on hand.

The subject under consideration for the afternoon was "George Eliot's Silas Marner," which is often ranked as the most finished short story in the English language.

Miss Crouch gave "The life of George Eliot," showing her strong personality and that her greatest strength was in her intense human sympathy.

Miss Alison read an excellent paper on "The Story of Silas Marner." This was followed by "Eliot's Methodism in the Introduction of Characters" by Mrs. Ament, who thought that what others had taught as philosophy George Eliot taught in the novel, making it easier in this way for the ethics of morality to permeate society at large. She also spoke of Eliot's knowledge of human nature and her sympathetic study and comprehension of the English country life.

Mrs. Williams read from "Silas Marner" in a delightful manner the "Inn Scene" showing another side of the author in which wit and humor stands out quaint and sparkling amid the darker back ground of her character studies.

The members all took part in the table talk on "Eliot's Delineation of the English Peasant" which concluded the afternoon's program.

**On Dewey's Fleet.**

John F. Clark of Topeka, Kansas, arrived this week for a visit to his brother, A. S. Clark of this city. Mr. Clark is quite an interesting person to meet, having been a sailor on board the battle ship Baltimore in Dewey's fleet and participated in the noted conflict in Manila Bay. He sailed from San Francisco, Oct. 30, 1897, and joined Dewey's fleet on April 23, at Hong Kong, China.

Mr. Clark gives a fine account of the famous battle in which the Baltimore occupied a position next to the flag-ship Olympia and was the only vessel that suffered materially from the shells of the opposing fleet. Mr. Clark was one of the shellmen during the fight, the shells used averaging 150 pounds in weight.

On the third day of October 1899, in a fight with the Filipinos, he received a wound in the right hip and now wears the ball mounted as a charm for his watch chain.

Mr. Clark received an honorable discharge three days after his arrival in New York last September.

**J. B. Mitchell.**

Dr. W. H. Black left Wednesday morning for Kirksville, to conduct the funeral of the late Rev. J. B. Mitchell, who died Tuesday morning, March 12, 1901 and whose funeral took place on Thursday at 1 o'clock. Dr. Mitchell will be remembered by many Marshall people as president of the educational convention that located Missouri Valley College in Marshall and was one of the most distinguished ministers in the Cumberland Presbyterian church. He was the father of Rev. J. W. Mitchell of this city, was 80 years of age, a grand character and very much beloved by all who knew him.

Mrs. Melissa Dulaney, wife of Landon Dulaney, died at her home near New Prospect church, Saline county, Mo., at 2:30 a. m. March 11, 1901, after a short illness of pneumonia.

**The Medical Enactment.**

With Governor Dockery's signature, the medical license bill introduced by M. W. Hall of Saline county becomes a law of the state of Missouri. The measure makes the state board of health a board of medical examiners, before whom every practitioner of medicine and surgery in the state is required to secure a certificate as to fitness through an examination, in which the candidate must answer 75 per cent

of the questions offered in such test, before allowed to charge for the service of his profession.

Applications for examination must be filed with the secretary of this board 30 days prior to its meeting. The subjects of which a knowledge is required are anatomy, chemistry, physiology, pathology, therapeutics, obstetrics and gynecology, the examination to be either partly or wholly written.

Free service is not in the least prohibited; the people are merely protected from the charges of quacks and fakes, who know little, but charge exorbitantly for "wonderful cures" fraudulently represented. The magnetic healers, unless they undertake a study of medicine will have to go, as few of them have the first rudiments of the knowledge that would entitle them to practice their profession. The Christian Scientists, considering the plea that their faith cures are a part of their religion, have shown themselves very anxious as to compensation for their services.
