Mineral in Saline

Mr. Crockett, who is here from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, on a visit, brought us in Tuesday a chunk of lead tiff from Bald Knob, which is in sight of his city. The tiff shows a strong indication of lead and copper. With Mr. Crockett was Herman Ludwig of south of Marshall who firmly believes that Saline is wealthy in minerals. He says there are many traces of zinc along Blackwater, that between Nelson and Arrow Rock are numerous sink-holes, caused by old Spanish and French mines collapsing and that the Lamine was named by the early miners "The Mine" because of the mining along same. He thinks there is also plenty of lead around Nelson. These gentlemen think an effort should be made to open up mines in Saline and secure her hidden wealth.

Limited Derailed

Bloomington, Ill., September 2.—The breaking of a driving tire on the engine pulling the Chicago and Alton limited, which left St. Louis at 9:04 Sunday morning for Chicago, resulted in the derailment of the entire train with the exception of the rear car, while the train was going at full speed, eight miles north of this city, at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

There were wild reports of many people being killed and injured, and the company sent out a relief train and a corps of doctors, but their services were not needed. Although five cars were thrown from the track, some careening dangerously, not a person was seriously hurt, the escape being one of the most remarkable on record.

The derailed cars blocked both main tracks and all traffic was stopped until midnight, when one track was opened.
