MISSOURI BEE-KEEPERS

Had Splendid Meeting here Tuesday and Wednesday.

The fifth annual meeting of the Missouri Bee-Keepers' Association was held in County Supt. W. C. Fisher's office Tuesday and Wednesday. The association had the promise of the circuit court room, but as court was in session they were given the other place.

Seventeen counties were represented by about fifty delegates, all experts at handling the "hot-footed varmints."

There was a nice display of honey, wax and bees of various kinds. Jas. T. Shackelford, of Napton, had on display a large nest of hornets. The hornets were of course in captivity, and attracted much attention. They were guaranteed to be the genuine article and if anyone doubted it he had the privilege of a public test—there were no doubters.

Besides this was a large nest of yellow jackets (those with the electric attachments) and a nest of bumble bees (the old fashioned kind that grew when we were boys), a large nest of wasps, live bees and other live stock, all of a very interesting nature.

An unfortunate accident happened Monday night after the display was in place. E. G. Guthrie of Malta Bend had in his display a five gallon bottle of fine honey which in some manner was broken and the honey flowed over the exhibit and on to the floor. Mr. Guthrie was unable to guess at how the accident happened.

J. W. Rouse of Mexico, was re-elected president; E. G. Guthrie of Malta Bend, vice-president; Robert A. Hollcamp, St. Louis, Secretary and treasurer.

The association decided to work for the Foul Brood Bill which was vetoed by Gov. Folk two years ago.

M. E. Tribble, of Marshall, Jas. T. Shackelford of Napton, E. G. Guthrie of Malta Bend, and N. R. White, of Nelson, were the active local bee men in the meeting. We are under obligations to the last named gentleman for a jar of fine honey.

MARSHALL'S BIG EVENT.

Corn Carnival, Horse Show, Beautiful Decorations, Illuminations and Scores of Amusement Features.

One Week—October 15 to 20.

If there is one thing Marshall does and does well, it is entertaining. The people in the surrounding towns and the entire Saline county enjoy coming to Marshall because of the assurance they feel in being repaid for the journey. They have never been disappointed and it is safe to say the week of October 15 will prove, weather permitting, the greatest in the history of the town.

Premium lists will be out today and sent broadcast over the state, as will elaborate advertising matter covering every town in 50 miles of Marshall. The stores and business houses will be decorated and illuminated and the square will be given up to the exhibits of corn, horses and mules.

The city council has granted the use of the hitching rack grounds and this will be transformed into a beautiful Ferris Wheel. A band of 30

white city, with an entrance from the square, down one of the side streets which will be honeycombed with flags, arches and colored lights. The several attractions comprising "White City" will be a comic opera production, "Beautiful Bagdad," with 50 people in the cast and a symphony orchestra of 15. This magnificent show will be given under a large canvas, seating 2000 people, 700 of the seats being opera chairs. Nothing of this magnitude has ever been previously attempted, excepting the last season tour of Madame Bernhart, when she played "Texas" under the same tent used for this production.

Aside from this feature show, there will be Hale's Tours of the World, Creation, Eruption of Vesuvius, "La Reve," Novelty Theater, rack grounds and this will be \$10,000 Carry-Us-All and transformed into a beautiful Ferris Wheel. A band of 30

pieces will give 2 concerts daily and the high wire-walking elephant and the famous Granada and Fedora will also appear free on the streets afternoon and evening. It is safe to say that the week of October 15 to 20 will be the red letter week in the history of Marshall.

Fine Concert

The Rahm family concert at the opera house Tuesday night was a splendid one. The children showed fine training and every piece played was thoroughly enjoyed. The small audience does not speak well for Marshall, but possibly shows a strong sentiment in this city against the Mistletoe Club. The members failed to come out strongly and the concert going people seemed to stay away because of the fact that the concert was given under the auspices of the club.

Manager F. Morris thinks Marshall people simply do not care for music and said he was not surprised at the small attendance.
