

### Saline County Teachers Assoc'n Held Annual Meeting in Marshall last Week.

Among the many things of interest in our city last week was the Saline County Teachers' Association which convened in the Circuit Court room, with Superintendent W. C. Fisher presiding.

Following the organization, the subject, "Conditions Affecting Education in the County and How to Improve Them," in the absence of H. A. Edwards and Miss Anna Boatright, was ably presented by Superintendent W. C. Fisher and others present.

Thursday afternoon, "Primary Reading and How Taught?" was the subject of an excellent paper by Miss Minnie Orear. "When and How Long to Use Third and Fourth Readers?" was given in an entertaining and helpful paper by Mr. Rob't Johnson, of Slater. "Advanced

Reading and Literature Subject Matter and Method," by J. T. Hixon, principal of the West building. This paper was very fine, and gave evidence of careful preparation. A general discussion by the Association of these subjects followed the three papers. Miss Vic Levy, who has taught the Shackelford school for several years, read a paper, subject, "Amount of Number Work That Should be Done in the First and Second Reader Grades." This was one of the best papers of the lay and contained many helpful and practical suggestions. The last paper on the program was by Miss Anna Dysart, of Malta Bend, subject, "The Extent and Nature of Language Work for First and Second Reader Grades." This was also one of the best of the convention. Thursday evening the association listened to two fine addresses by Dr. R. H. Jesse, of Columbia, and State Superintendent

Carrington. Dr. Jesse spoke on "Secondary Education," and Mr. Carrington on "Teachers' Preparation."

On Friday the association assisted in the dedication of Mo. Valley College chapel, and at the meeting of the association and college union Friday evening adjourned.

Following are the resolutions adopted:

Marshall, Mo., Oct. 20, 1906. Be it resolved by the teachers of Saline county in association assembled.

First:—That the thanks of this Association are extended to Supt. W. T. Carrington. He has been untiring in his efforts to build up and strengthen the work of the rural school of Missouri and has rendered them more efficient thereby. As he is about to retire from the office he has so ably filled, we feel that we shall miss his kindly presence in our meetings, and that the encouragement and inspiration we have had from his talks

and addresses we shall always miss. We bespeak for him unbounded success in his new field of labor.

Second:—That the thanks of this Association be extended to Dr. R. H. Jesse for his inspiring address on the condition of secondary education in Missouri. We feel that much is due to Dr. Jesse for the wonderful development in the efficiency of secondary schools of Missouri.

Third:—That we express our appreciation of the growth of the educational spirit in Saline county. This spirit is manifested in the expenditure of large sums for new buildings and equipments, no fewer than four of Saline towns having provided for new buildings in the past two years and no less than \$200,000 having been expended.

Fourth:—That our thanks are extended to Prof. I. N. Eward for the interest he manifests in the public school work and for his effort to make the work of the Association helpful.

Fifth:—That the thanks of this Association are due to Supt. C. H. Hitchborn for the able manner in which he has presided over its various meetings.

Sixth:—That we reaffirm our faith in County Supervision of schools. Under the able Supervision of Supt. W. C. Fisher Saline County Schools have improved in efficiency. We believe that there is room for improvement in the laws governing County Supervision and respectfully submit the same to the consideration of our representatives in the General Assembly.

Seventh:—That a vote of appreciation is extended to the Faculty, and the Board of Trustees of M. V. C. for the special invitation to take part in the dedicatory exercises of Stewart Chapel. It was an occasion the like of which a teacher's association seldom has an opportunity to enjoy.
