Killed by Robbers

Edward Reed, a stockman of Mexico, Mo., was held up by robbers near the square in that city Friday night. They beat him into unconsciousness and he laid there till morning. As a result of his injuries he died Saturday. \$2,500 reward is offered for the conviction of his assailants. Mr. Reed has a brother residing near Norton and he was a brother-in-law of Mrs. J. T. Featherstone of this city.

Probably Assassinated

Mexico, Mo., May 13.—The coroner's inquest over the body of Ed Reed, the stockman who died from the effects of an attack by unidentified men, reconvened to-day and probably will continue the entire week. The inquest is being conducted behind locked doors.

The robbery theory is now discredited, and it is believed Reed met his death at the hands of assassins. Several detectives are here on the case.
