Fight Two-Cent Law

Jefferson City, Mo., June 10.—It was stated in a recent dispatch that all the railroads in the state would observe the 2-cent passenger rate law provided for in the bill adopted at the recent session of the legislature.

It is learned that all the roads will resist this law, and that an injunction will be applied for in the federal court in Kansas City. The position will be taken that the rate is confiscatory. The same course will be pursued, it is learned from the same source, with regard to the maximum freight rate bill.

These injunctions, it is stated, will be applied for June 14, the rate going into effect, if no opposition were made, June 16. The maximum freight law of 1905, which is still in the courts, was repealed by the enactment of 1907, and the later measure, it seems, is also to be contested on the ground that the rate it fixes for the several schedules is confiscatory.
