### TRAINED ANIMAL DISPLAY

#### Something Unusual in this Line Promised by the Barnum & Bailey Circus

"Do animals reason?" is a question that has perplexed philosophers for ages, and even in these practical days the question is debated pro and con with more or less acrimony. Judging from results, furnished by the animals themselves, the advocates of reason in the so-called dumb brutes seem to have a little the best of the argument.

This view is apparently confirmed by the remarkable results said to have been achieved by the Barnum & Bailey animal trainers in handling various kinds of wild and domestic beasts. If they accomplish all the feats they are credited with—and there is no reason to doubt it—the trained animals with the Barnum & Bailey circus come as near possessing human intelligence as their mental and physical structure will permit.

Among the notable trained animal displays that will be seen with the big show when it exhibits here September 21st are several that are quite new to this country, and which are said to be a revelation in the line of intelligent animal education. The list embraces a remarkable company of wonderfully trained elephants, ponies and dogs that display their cleverness in conjunction with a new European acrobatic act by the Novellos; Herzog's horses which, both in harness and at liberty, give a performance that sets a new standard for exhibitions of this character; Wilton's riding seal, a cleverly trained amphibian that performs a series of surprising balancing and other feats on a swiftly moving horse; a troupe of notably clever bicycle riding apes and dog-face monkeys; Winston's school of performing sea-lions, three herds of acting elephants, and many other animal acts of a most unusual character.

These interesting animal displays, it is announced, are interspersed through a program that is notably replete with new things in acrobatic, equestrian and mid-air performances. The circus company includes three hundred artists from all parts of the world, and the program shows a hundred acts of various kinds. In one serial number in which the Viennese and Steves troupes of mid-air vaulting participate, there are twenty gymnasts in the air at one time. In a big

acrobatic number, dominated by the Gruntho and Castrillon troupes, an equal number of performers simultaneously appear in a series of double and triple somersaults and lofty pyramids. In one equestrian number twelve horsemen and horsewomen appear at one time.

As though these features were not sufficient to rivet public attention, the management announces a superb allegorical spectacle entitled "Peace," founded on the Russo-Japanese war; a revival of the old Roman hippodrome on a tremendous scale; a greatly augmented menagerie and several thrillers of a most astonishing character. In one, a daring Ski Sailor flies 75 feet through the air on 8-foot skees; in another, a courageous American girl flies 40 feet through the air in an inverted automobile; and in still another, two daring bicyclists turn somersaults in mid-air while soaring in space on their wheels. It is not surprising that these latest among thrillers have created a sensation, or that in them the limit of possibility in sensational circus acts seems to have been reached.
