Mrs. Chaffee was formerly Miss Tessie Ashley, daughter of Jas. Ashley, who died this fall. Her age was 37 years and 1 day. She leaves besides the sorrowing husband, five children and many relatives and friends.

Two weeks ago Sunday, Ernest Hunter, the 16-year-old son of Mrs. Susan Hunter of College Addition, was taken seriously ill with locked bowels. All that medical skill could do was done for him and he even underwent an opera-

tion, but to no avail. He died Monday, Dec. 9th at 10:45 p. m.

Obituary.

Harwood Rouse was born in Ross county, Ohio, near Chillicothe on the 17th of Sept. 1822, died at his home near Granville, Mo., on the 6th of December. Consequently he passed his seventy-fifth birthday. He united with the Methodist Episcopal church at the age of 16 years and lived a consistent christian life to the end. At the age of 33 he was married to Miss Sarah Baker. Five children were born to this union. Two died in infancy and a daughter at the age of 12. One daughter and a son with the

mother still survives. Mr. Rouse was a faithful church worker and for years was a Sunday school Superintendent. He died as he had lived in the triumph of the christian faith. He rests from labor and his works follow him. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity for over 50 years.

C. & A. Depot Robbed Again.

Herman Stoll, night operator at the C. & A. depot, who had just gotten over the robbery of several months ago when he was compelled to turn the cash drawer over again Friday night to a highwayman. About 1 a. m. Saturday morning he was sitting at his keyboard near the north window, revolver at his side, when suddenly the window was smashed in and a revolver leveled at his head. His revolver at the same time was taken out through the broken window. He was asked to turn over the cash drawer, which he did. It contained \$45.00. The robber made his escape with but a slight clew as to the perpetrator. The C. & A. has been suffering considerably of late from holdups, robberies having but recently been committed at Gilliam, Marshall and Shackelford.

Another Suicide.

Sam Dyke, a well known farmer of Blue Lick drowned himself in Blackwater creek on last Thursday afternoon. He had been discouraged for the past few weeks and it is supposed that his mind was affected. His body was discovered by his nephew who attracted to the place by Mr. Dyke's dog who was barking furiously and acting strangely at the place where his master's body lay. A mistake came near costing Gus Fencher of Blue Lick his life last week. He accidentally drank some strong acid that badly burned his mouth, face and throat. He was laid up several days but is about well again. It was generally reported that he attempted suicide but he denies this.

Several Big Land Deals.

Elsea & Hains have just closed the sale of 1140 acres of Red River Valley Land in Texas to J. F. Burroughs, of Marshall for \$33,550. In exchange R. S. Allen took 226 acres near Houston, Texas, and a life interest in 400 acres four miles north of Marshall, consideration \$14,650. They also sold to Geo. Young of Marshall 1150 acres of Red River Valley land for the sum of \$31,500 who gave in exchange 396 acres 14 miles north of Marshall consideration \$23,160. These sales total \$105,860.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

Gun Explodes and Louis Reppenhagen is Badly Hurt.

Louis, the 14-year-old son of C. L. Reppenhagen, last Friday went hunting east of town. Near the "Y" on the Mo. Pacific Ry. he met another Marshall boy with an old shotgun. They talked with another and finally Louis decided to try the other boy's gun. He had some smokeless powder, stronger than the ordinary black powder with him and with this loaded the gun and aimed at a bottle near by. The gun burst and badly tore up his left arm. The shock rendered Louis unconscious and the other boy, probably thinking he had been killed, quickly left the scene. After regaining consciousness Louis succeeded in getting home and was attended by a physician who reports him doing nicely.

A Serious Charge.

Edw. Carper, a colored lad of 18 years, was arrested on a charge of having fired into a C. & A. passenger train Saturday evening. The car fortunately was empty and no one was hurt. At his preliminary trial the boy waived examination and was bound over to the next term of the criminal court under \$300 bond.
