**Found Dead Infant**

J. W. Weldon, of Slater, found the body of a dead infant under his wood shed last Sunday. He notified the coroner and the matter was thoroughly investigated before a jury Monday but no verdict reached. The jury is to meet again next Wednesday and something sensational may be expected.

A young girl, whose father lives east of Gilliam, was taken into custody as the supposed mother of the infant. She is said to be a good girl, but is only 17 years old and not acquainted with the ways of the world and it is hoped that the man or men who have caused her sorrow will be severely punished. It is not known whether the child was born dead or died from exposure. The girl is in Marshall awaiting the action of the coroner's jury.

**THE HORNE TRIAL.**

Case Given to Jury at 1 30 A. M. Thursday.

Up to the time of going to press yesterday the jury in the Horne trial had not returned a verdict so that least part of our readers will not learn the result till next week.

Probably some of our readers feel that we have not given then as complete a report of the Horne trial as we should. It has been intentionally omitted because it is impossible to do the case justice in a weekly paper, unless everything else is omitted. There were a very large number of witnesses in the trial from Marshall and Kansas City and a number of experts were placed on the stand. The testimony brought out the fact that Gen. Horne lost his position as chief clerk in Jefferson City because a candidate he was working for was defeated. That he was in straightened circumstances at the time and had to borrow the money to bury his child that died at the time. That he borrowed money on his Marshall residence soon after to buy the Index, but which he sold again in a short time because it was a losing proposition. That while looking for an opening he was offered the position of editor of the Kansas City Post if he invested \$1000 there. He used the insurance money from his recently burned residence to do so. That he was employed by the Post as editor at \$25 per week, but that in reality he was not the editor as his policy was not accepted by the management. That Mr. Horne felt he was not being paid enough and that he was humiliated by the paper's policy. That his business reverses and treatment received caused him to worry

and become discouraged. That he purchased a revolver, spent a sleepless night over his grievances and the next morning shot Groves and Woodward, the former dying.

Horne's attorneys are defending him with a plea of insanity, claiming that he is a paranoiac and did not know right from wrong when he did the shooting.

The case has been under way nearly two weeks and the technical phrases made it somewhat tiring.

**A Fine Record.**

L. Watts, of Portland, Oregon, was home on a visit to his parents near Arrow Rock several weeks and returned Wednesday. His father was 91 years old on March 6th and is enjoying good health. His parents have been married 60 years. Mr. Watts told us that they are still using a dining table that they bought when they were married. He says he likes Portland and is doing well there.

**Bourke Freed**

A large number were here from Malta Bend Tuesday in the Bourke case. R. J. Bourke was charged with getting money under false pretenses. He claimed to be agent for a St. Louis concern and sold the Malta Bend Ice Co. some ice machinery on a contract and received \$1000 from them.

The St. Louis firm later disowned Bourke and refused to fill the contract. Bourke's arrest followed. Now the contention will be between the ice company and the St. Louis firm.
