

### A SEVERE STORM.

#### Saline County Had Narrow Escape Friday Evening.

Last Friday evening between five and six o'clock an ugly looking storm struck Saline county near Emma, passed north of Sweet Springs, the most destructive part passing about six miles north of Sweet Springs; it turned a little and came direct for Marshall, arriving here a few minutes after six. It seemed to hit Marshall squarely, but the most damage was done in the southern part of town.

The Marshall greenhouse had about 500 window panes broken, M. V. C. about 100, the West School Building, Colony and many other exposed buildings lost many window panes by the destructive hail that accompanied the storm. From Marshall the storm went almost due east, striking near Hardeman severely, where some barns are reported destroyed.

The storm was in the nature of a cyclone that dipped down at times and became worse. It was accompanied by an unusual severe hail storm, the hailstones being from a hazelnut to a walnut in size, with occasionally one as large as a chicken's egg. The hail knocked off a great many buds from the trees in its route. Near Elmwood some chickens

were reported killed by the hail as well as many window panes broken.

To say that the people of Saline are fortunate is saying the least, as a storm of such severity in traversing a distance of forty miles, as it did over Saline, usually causes serious damage somewhere along its route.

The clouds had the dark green appearance indicating hail and were badly mixed up by the furious lashing of the winds.

### SWEET SPRINGS ROBBERY

#### Postoffice Safe Blown Open and \$1400 Secured.

The postoffice at Sweet Springs was entered Tuesday night by burglars who got in through the back door and dynamited the safe and made away with \$400 in cash and about \$1000 in stamps.

The robbery was not discovered till in the morning, although the explosion was heard by Wm. Shackelford, of Napton; F. O. Shephard and Preston Eades, of Arrow Rock who were delegates to the Modern Woodmen convention in session there and were asleep in the city hotel across the street from the postoffice. They thought it was a regular performance in Sweet Springs and paid little attention to it at the time.

Some arrests were made in Kansas City Wednesday but we are unable to learn if any definite clues have been secured.

### Big Scare, Little Damage

The fire was discovered and put out before the fire department arrived and no damage resulted.

### Many Killed by Earthquake.

In and around the city of Mexico probably 500 persons were killed and much property was destroyed by an earthquake last Thursday. One of the peculiar features of the earthquake is that the disturbance extended in a straight line just west of the 99th parallel for 500 miles north and south, beginning at Mier, just south of the Rio Grande in the State of Nuevo Leon, and ending at Chilapa, in the State of Guerrero.

That part of the country which suffered the greatest loss is about 100 miles south of the City of Mexico and the volcano of Popocatepetl. This region is volcanic.

### WITH AMERICAN FLEET

#### Joseph Holloway Writes His Mother Interesting Account of Trip

Blue Lick, Mar. 25, '08.  
Editor Marshall Republican:

I will drop you a few interesting lines. I received on March 22d a letter from my son, Joe Holloway who is with the Atlantic fleet which sailed from Hampton Roads Dec. 16th. They are now at Magdalena Bay, Mexico, for target practice. He said that he enjoyed his trip fine. The weather was nice and that he had been in several different climates since they left the East. He said it was like old summer time when they got to the equator but it was not long until they had to change their white clothes and put on their Blue. Joe said the most beautiful sight he ever saw was when the ship was going through the Strait of Magellan. The sailors got out on the deck to view the grand sight of the mountains covered with snow and ice glittering in the sunshine, but it set in to raining and they didn't get to see the rest of the straits for they were soon out in the Big Pacific. Joe said that the people there at the strait said it was summer time there then but it didn't feel much like summer to him when water freezes every night. At the straits the sun sets at 3 o'clock in the winter season and at 9 in summer. He thinks they will have target practice about three weeks, then go to San Francisco Cal., for a short stay and then they will start on their Northern trip home-ward bound. He says that he wants to see the other side of the globe. The only incident on the 13,000 miles cruise was the death of three of their comrades and the saddest of these was their shipmate buried at sea. With all due honors his body was committed to the deep. And one thing he says that he enjoys in the faraway lands is reading the good old Marshall Republican.
