Has he ever given any practical demonstration of his ability to meet problems and solve them? Has he ever done anything but formulate propositions in his closet of an utterly impracticable plausibility, and very little with a view of their operation? By their fruits we shall know them."

Brazil's Coffee is Collapsed

New York, October 16—After having sustained a loss of \$15,000,000, Brazil has abandoned its attempt to corner the world's coffee market. For two years the Government of Sao Paulo, the chief state of Brazil, has been purchasing coffee from its planters with the avowed intention of keeping up the price; now, after having expended \$75,000,000 and having on hand 8,000,000 bags of coffee the valorization scheme—as the attempted corner was called—is to be definitely renounced. At the same time, a record of advice received to day from abroad, a loan of \$75,000,000, which has been negotiated for some time to take care of the present huge accumulation, is soon to be offered for public subscription. The collapse of this attempted corner ends what is regarded as one of the most interesting but foolhardy financial experiments ever attempted. The "valorization scheme" had its origin six years ago, when an enormous Brazilian coffee crop set prices down violently to 3 1-2 cents a pound in the New York market, actually below the cost of production. Sao Paulo immediately imposed a prohibitive tax to prevent the planting of new trees, but this had no effect on crops, as the tree does not begin to produce marketable berries for five years, and does not reach full maturity until it is ten years old. Bumper crops followed one another, and in 1905 the state was genuinely alarmed when the harvest returned 20,000,000 bags, a surplus over the entire world's requirements of something like 8,000,000 bags. It was then that the scheme of cornering the market was planned. Three states of Brazil, Sao Paulo, Rio, and Minas, set out to

old profitable level. Besides imposing a large surtax on exports, the states began buying with borrowed money, all unexported coffee. In two years Sao Paulo had purchased from the planters no less than 8,000,000 bags at an average cost of \$10 a bag, which was more than double the ruling market price. The money thus recklessly spent had been secured at home, in the United States, Germany and elsewhere, at a high cost. Now that it has been used in "valorizing" coffee, these various loans are to be consolidated into one. Hence the \$75,000,000 loan is to be offered for public subscription in the United States and Europe.

How Taft Was Sounded by McKinley.

The Manner in Which the Republican Candidate Was Called to a Larger Sphere of Action. One afternoon early in 1900, when Judge William H. Taft was dictating a decision of the United States Court in the Federal Building in Cincinnati, a telegram was placed in his hands. He tore off the envelope and was surprised to find a telegram from President William McKinley, reading: "I shall take it as a great favor if you will call on me some time next week."
