MRS. MALLMAN died at the home of her son, John, near Hardeman, at 5 a. m. Saturday, December 12th as the result of a paralytic stroke received the Monday previous. She was 72 years old. She is survived by four children—John at Hardeman; Wm. of North Dakota; Mrs. E. L. Fenwick, Mrs. John Bailey of Southwest Missouri.

Mrs. Mallman was an old settler and a fine old Christian lady. Her remains were laid to rest in Arrow Rock cemetery Sunday.

MRS. MARY CRUZEN STEELE died at the home of her sister, Mrs. T. S. Steele on College addition, Wednesday, Dec. 16th 9 a. m. of old age after a long illness. She was born in Virginia Jan. 4th 1829, making her age nearly 80 years. Her remains were sent by Undertaker Walker to her old home in Fairfax, Mo., for burial today. Funeral services were held at the residence at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Killed While Out Hunting.

Rev. J. L. Sullens, Former Saline County Pastor Killed Wednesday.

Springfield, Mo., Dec. 16.—The Rev. James L. Sullens, pastor of a South Methodist church here and the father of ten children died today in an ambulance three miles north of Springfield after being accidentally shot while hunting. Two charges of bird shot from a double-barrel gun in the hands of S. F. Jared, a merchant, entered the minister's right side.

Jared was but four feet away when Mr. Sullens fired at a rabbit. Jared turned around quickly to shoot at the cottontail and his gun was accidentally discharged.

An ambulance and surgeon were summoned to the woods by telephone and the wounded man was on the way home when he expired four hours after the accident.

After doctors had examined Sullens's wounds as he lay on a bed of leaves in the woods, they told him he could not live. Jared began to weep and the preacher said:

"Don't cry, brother Jared; you couldn't help it. It was an accident. I am not afraid to die, but what will become of my wife and children?"

Mr. Sullens had been in the Southwest Missouri Conference since 1889, and had held charges at Marshall, Orearville, Shiloh, Slater, Clinton, Monett and Webb City.

Rev. Sullens was 54 years old and was well known here. He is spoken of by all who knew him as a splendid man. The accident indeed a sad one.
