DEATHS

MRS. C. B. GOODWIN died at 7.30 Friday morning March 12th at Roswell, New Mexico, after a lingering illness of consumption.

Mrs. Goodwin went to New Mexico several months ago with the hope of bettering her health, which had been failing for some time, but the change of climate seemed to do her little good and she sank steadily until the end. About two weeks ago her condition was so alarming that Mr. Goodwin hastened to her side and remained with her till her death.

Mrs. Goodwin was born in Lexington Aug. 29 1875. Her maiden name was Miss Eugenia Davis and she was the youngest daughter of Col. and Mrs. Tilton Davis. No young lady in Lexington was ever more deservedly popular than Miss Davis.

On June 14, 1900, she was married at the home of her parents to Clifford B. Goodwin, the sorrowing husband.

The union was blessed with a daughter, Marjorie, now six years old who will now be a solace and comfort to her father in his sad bereavement. The family enjoyed an ideal life of domestic contentment until Mrs. Goodwin's health began to fail. For some time her death had seemed inevitable and this cast gloom over the household.

The death of Mrs. Goodwin will be widely mourned outside of her immediate family; for both here and in Lexington she had a large circle of friends.

MRS. LUCY SEEVER died at the home of her brother, J. M. Harrison, in Slater, Sunday March 14, aged 99 years. She is survived by two children. Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2 p. m. conducted by Rev. W. T. Henson after which her remains were laid to rest in the city cemetery.

MORRIS HOPKINS, the eight month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Hopkins, died at their home in Miles City, Montana, and the remains brought to Arrow Rock and laid to rest Wednesday afternoon in the Arrow Rock cemetery.

MRS. JULIA LATHAM died Wednesday night at her home southeast of town at an advanced age. Funeral today at 10 a. m.

DICK GIBSON, col., died in East Marshall on March 14th, of consumption after several months confinement, aged 59 years. He leaves 8 children to mourn his death. He was a faithful and hard-working employe of Rose Bros. for 24 years and was considered a good man.

Report of Grand Jury

To the honorable Criminal court of Saline county, Missouri.

We, the grand jury of Saline county, for the March term of the Criminal court, 1909, beg leave to make the following report:

We have examined the County Jail and find same to be in a very unsanitary condition, badly ventilated, badly lighted, and absolutely and entirely unsuitable for a place to keep human beings even though they are charged or convicted of a criminal offense. The sheriff keeps the jail in as good condition as is possible for any one to do with the material placed at his disposal. We understand that several criminals have escaped with comparative ease and see no reason why the same could not be done, at any time unless guarded almost every hour by an officer. We recommend that the county court take immediate steps to better this condition either by satisfactory remodeling the old jail or building a new one.

We have visited the Poor Farm and find that the statements made by the former grand jury in regard to the building have not been overdrawn because it is impossible for the miserable condition of said building to be stated too strongly. We feel that on account of the dilapidated and unsafe condition of these buildings, new ones should be provided as soon as possible and we hereby commend the county court for calling an election to vote on the question of issuing bonds for the purpose of building a suitable Poor House and we urge every citizen of Saline county to give his assistance to the construction of a necessary building for the poor and unfortunate of this county.

Mr. Wilson, the superintendent, manages the farm and inmates as well as could be done under the circumstances. We urge it as a duty upon every citizen of this county to investigate for himself to see if our statements are true and if you will take the trouble to go to the poor farm you will certainly be convinced that we are correct.
