All entries for animals for any day of the fair must be made to C. H. Tucker, secretary of the Executive Committee, on or before 9 o'clock a. m. of the day the animal is to be exhibited, put after that time positively no entries will be made.

Every article or animal upon the ground of the fair shall, during the continuance of the fair, be under the control of the Executive Committee.

All poultry will be fed and looked after, and all exhibits in the agricultural, textile and pantry de-

partment will be given the most careful attention. All exhibits in these five departments must be entered and in place not later than 10 o'clock a. m. Sept. 30, and left in place until the afternoon of Saturday Oct. 2nd.

No entrance fee will be charged in any department and competition in all cases is open to all. You are invited to attend the fair and make an exhibit if possible. Send in your name to C. H. Tucker, Secretary of the Executive Committee, with the name of the article you wish to exhibit and the class number of the premium list.


