**MRS. BETTIE A. WALTON**, widow of the late J. E. Walton, one of Slater's leading business men, died at her home in Slater Wednesday at the age of 63 years. She is survived by four children: J. F., Wallace, Mrs. J. K. Dulaney, Mrs. L. R. Ervine. She was a splendid lady and much liked. Her funeral services at 2 p. m. today, Friday.

**THOS ALFRED McCLELLAND**, who for many years was a resident of Saline County died at his home at 2407 East 12th Street, Kansas City, last Monday morning at the age of 63 years. Septic poisoning, resulting from several complaints, was the cause of his death.

Mr. McClelland sold his farm near Hardeman several years ago and invested in Kansas City real estate, and mining business in Joplin. He was a director in one of the banks at Joplin and his wealth is estimated at nearly a million dollars. He is survived by three sons, Robt. T. Thos. N., and Elisha R. McClelland.—Slater Rustler.

## "Early Bird" Strikes Two

**Randolph Murphy and Gabriel Roesen the Victims**

A few minutes before 4 o'clock last Sunday morning Randolph Murphy and Gabriel Roesen, section men residing in East Slater, who had been called out to clear up a little wreck caused by the switch engine, were struck by passenger No. 23 known as the Early Bird and were both badly injured.

Randolph Murphy sustained a mashed foot, leg, arm, broken shoulder bone and other bruises. Dr. Howard the railroad physician was called and looked after his injuries. He remained unconscious till Sunday evening and since has shown some improvement and the doctor tells us that he has a good prospect for recovery. He is a son of Robt. Murphy, of Fish Creek vicinity.

Gabriel Roesen had one foot so badly crushed that it was amputated. He seems in no special danger from his other bruises.

Owing to the wreck the passenger was routed over a side track and the men were under the impression that it would pass over the main track and as there was considerable noise and steam they didn't see the approaching train. The accident happened at the east end of the Slater depot.

Both men are well known in and around Slater.

## A Bad Accident

A collision occurred at the corner of the Wood & Huston Bank Wednesday evening just before six between vehicles driven by M. L. Montague and June K. King in which Mrs. King sustained a broken collar bone. She was taken to a nearby physician's office and her injuries cared for. The King buggy was also badly damaged.

Mr. Montague was driving north rapidly and told us he thought Mr. King would stop when he found that he was going on he could not stop in time and his surrey struck the other squarely on the side, knocking it over. The horse's head struck Mrs. King. Mr. Montague was driving a race horse and said he was going at a 4-minute gait.

One of the best signs of Marshall's prosperity is the big improvement being made in our ice plant, which is being enlarged from a 35 to a 60 ton capacity. The building is being enlarged to a 100 ton capacity, so that the plant can be easily enlarged still further. The new building is being built of solid concrete—the first of its kind in Marshall.

Two large cold storage rooms in the new building have been rented by the New York Racket for refrigerator purposes and will give this firm a big advantage in both storing and car load shipping. The improvements costing about \$20,000 are being made by Chas. Petroy and son Chas. Jr. and they know their business too.
