

# TO CHANGE COURSE OF SALT FORK

## A Way Found to Solve Flood Problem

J. H. Nolen, representing the state in its reclamation work, was in Marshall last week in the interest of Saline county flooded lands, and especially Salt Fork bottoms. He made our office a pleasant call and in speaking of his work said that the damage by flood will eventually be overcome and then our low lands will be worth \$150 an acre instead of \$50.

Speaking of Salt Fork he said that the overflowed parts won't warrant in his opinion, the expense of straightening the stream, but that instead he expects to solve the problem by making a cut of one-quarter mile near Grand Pass so that the stream will empty into the Missouri at that point. The water below will not be sufficient to do much damage. There is a place where Salt Fork can easily be directed into the river by the small cut mentioned and the stream will be guided by two levees on each side right to the river. Our State laws provide for such work by condemnation proceedings.

Speaking of the flood situation in southeast Missouri at the present time, Mr. Nolen stated that the flooding of the south-east territory of this state will no doubt be presented hereafter. He says much of the land now submerged in Mississippi, Scott and New Madrid counties has been recently organized into one drainage and levee district and that the system to be constructed will afford thorough protection to the land hereafter. The district was incorporated by the circuit court about ten days ago and it is hoped the system will be completed before another serious flood occurs.

Mr. Nolen had been advising the land owners in these counties for some months to provide additional protection for their land, but it was only recently that sentiment was crystallized in favor of taking all of the 275,000 acres of overflow land into one district and to outline a system that would protect all this land at all times. The tax for this work will not be excessive and the savings of one crop will be worth more than the total cost of levees and drains to be constructed.

The land owners in many parts of Missouri are paying Mr. Nolen to continue his work until the injunction suit brought against the State Auditor restraining him from paying the salary and expense bills of Nolen out of an appropriation made by the last legislature is passed upon by the circuit court of Cole county.

He, like State Game Warden Tollerton, is the victim of political machinations. The Democrats having cut off Mr. Tollerton's appropriation, the Republicans have been evening up with Mr. Nolen.
