## Some Fish Stories

The Illinois Fisherman, a spicy new paper published at Marine, Illinois, contained these interesting items last week. The Union Fish and Oyster Co., received a 900-lb. deep sea bass last month, but unfortunately it was cut up before shipment. It filled two large barrels after being dressed. A big mossback turtle got on the Santa Fe railroad track up in Knox county last month and blocked traffic for several hours. It was a big one and probably migrating from one stream to another. The railroad men were afraid to get near it and it was large to run over, so they waited for Mr. Turtle to move of his own accord. The Bender Fish & Oyster Co., of St. Louis, received a 1800-lb. turtle from the New England coast last month. It required 14 men to unload it from the dray in which it was delivered and it was estimated that from the 500 pounds of meat enough soup could be made to feed 5000 people. The head and mouth measured 3 feet in circumference. Some bass, catfish and a 25-lb buffalo were picked up recently on a railroad track near a stream in Kansas, after a severe storm. It is supposed the wind blew them from the water. Earl Heide killed a bull frog at Brickhouse slough, near Alton, recently, that measured 18 inches and is the record for frogs in that locality. Bait has been so scarce at Mt. Carmel, Ill., that barber in that town accept cans of worms as legal tender for shaves.
