 Elect Officers.

The Missouri Society of Teachers of
 Mathematics and Science held its an-
 nual business meeting in the physics
 lecture room this morning at 9 o'clock.
 The following officers were elected:

President, W. M. Butler, St. Louis;
 vice-presidents, F. C. Toutan, Kansas
 City, and H. G. Parker, Liberty; sec-
 retaries, Bertram Harry, Doniphan,
 and B. F. Stigall, Warrensburg; exec-

 H. C. Drayer, St. Louis, and B. F. Tin-
 kel, Springfield.

Reports of the secretary and treas-
 urer were heard and approved.

F. N. Peters of Kansas City spoke
 on "Science and Mathematics Teaching
 of the Future," at the joint session of
 the Missouri Society of Teachers of
 Mathematics and Science this morning.
 At a meeting of the mathematics div-
 ision held in the Agricultural lecture
 room this afternoon the following pro-
 gram was given:

Paper, "A Neglected Field," William
 A. Luby, Central high school, Kansas
 City; paper, "A Lesson in Arithmetic,"
 by A. S. Otterman, State Normal,
 Kirksville; paper, "The Teaching of
 Arithmetic," by W. S. Monroe, Nor-
 borne; discussion led by J. A. White-
 ford, St. Joseph; paper, "On the Log-
 ical Process of Plane Geometry," by
 B. F. Finkel, Drury College.

 in the Physics lecture room where the
 following program was held: paper,
 "The Teaching of Zoology in the High
 School," by John W. Scott, Kansas
 City; paper, "The Effect of Radium
 Rays on Plant Life," by C. S. Gager,
 Columbia; paper, "Exhibition and Dis-
 cussion of a Motor Devised for In-
 struction in the High Schools," by S.
 A. Douglass, Central high school, St.
 Louis; paper, "The Motion of the Gy-
 roscope," by H. M. Reese, University of
 Missouri, Columbia.
