**CHINESE ON HARVARD TEAM.**

Star Quarter-Miler of Celestial Empire Joins Track Squad.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Sept. 23.—To Kuo Chi Li belongs the distinction of being the first Chinese student at Harvard to enter athletics. Li has joined the track squad and is being urged by the coaches to go out for football because of his record at Pei Yatg University, Tien Tsen, China, where he was one of the best all-around athletes. His specialty was the quarter-mile, in which he is the holder of several Chinese records.

Li is related to Yuen Chi Kai, Governor of Chi Li Province, China. He is a senior at Harvard, where he is studying for the consular service. He is a member of the Cosmopolitan Club of Harvard.

Allerdice, who has charge of the work in the temporary absence of Yost, put together a bunch of men playing their regular positions as nearly as possible, and sent them through hard running practice for nearly an hour of the evening workout. CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 23.—Coach A. A. Stagg sprang his 1909 sensation today at Marshall Field. He gave the Maroon football squad six brand-new plays that he invented this summer, and more will follow. The answer is an entirely new repertoire for the Midway eleven this year, something produced for the sole purpose of winning the Western championship.

The University of Chicago tricks will be new ones this year from the blow of the whistle. The plays are the result of Stagg's summer meditations on the subject of the forward pass and the ultra-modern game of football. The formations given the team were all pronounced winners, the squad of veterans working them with a skill that surprised the inventor.

**CRAWFORDSVILLE, Ind., Sept. 23.**

—Coach Jesse Harper, the former Chicago University star, met his first piece of hard luck today with the definite announcement that Newton Bowman, captain elect of the Wabash College eleven, would not be eligible for the team this fall. Bowman will be out on account of studies and his successor will be named this week by the "W" men of the squad.

**MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Sept. 23.**

It was a pretty stiff bunch of athletes that turned out for football practice at the University. All the men realize that the time is short before the first game and every one is doing his best to make the team a winner. The men put on gym shirts and spent most of the afternoon in signal practice. Punting the ball is the schedule for tomorrow.

News from Lawrence seems to indicate that the little university has a sad lack of good material. The captain is the only old man back as the star end. Nelson has been ruled out as ineligible by the Board of Control. The team will be heavier than last year, the center weighing over 200 pounds.

**MADISON, Wis., Sept. 23.**

—Owing to a heavy rain storm the opening football practice at the University of Wisconsin was light and short. The small squad was put through some elementaries of the game and then taken to the gymnasium, where Coach Barry gave a short talk. There were no important additions to the squad, though several are expected tomorrow.

"How old are you?" asked a friend. "Twenty-four," was the reply. "Why not subtract 24 from 1909 and see what you have left?"


After figuring awhile the bewildered student said: "That leaves 1885. I remember now that is when I was born."

"Dr. Isidor Loeb, chairman of the entrance committee, tells me that about that many have sent in their certificates. There is a big growth throughout the entire school.

"The students of agriculture are coming more from the cities this year than ever before. In the past the students have been drawn largely from the farms of the state. Many students have entered from Kansas City, St. Louis and the larger towns of Missouri.

"I have never known so many college students to come here as there are this fall. William Jewell College, Lawrence and the Normal schools have good representations. I am well satisfied with the prospect."
