CORDOVA, Alaska, Sept. 29.—The training which he received on the football field helped enable H. F. Andrus, the old Yale guard, to win a fight for life in the Nizina River a few days ago in an accident that cost the lives of four companions.

Andrus was on the way down from the Easterly mine in a boat with his comrades when their craft was upset in Box Canyon. Andrus had a hard battle to keep afloat in the seething whirlpool, which beat him about among the rocks of the gorge and carried him one hundred yards before he had a chance to catch an overprojecting crag. The bodies of all of his companions were recovered except one. One of the men had had \$3,000 in gold with him, but this was lost.
