To earn a numeral in track one must
take first place in a dual inter-class
meet or first, second or third in an
inter-class or inter-department meet.
In football, baseball and basketball the
members of the team that wins first
place in the inter-class series are given
numerals.

The numerals are mounted in their
relative positions on paper and are
supposed to be put on the jerseys in
that position. The athletic department
has decided that they can be worn only
on the regulation "tiger" jersey. No
one but a numeral man can wear these
jerseys.

MAY GET TIME EXTENDED.

Bible College Faculty Hope for at Least
Two More Weeks.

A Kansas City newspaper says that
R. A. Long has granted an extension
of time to the Missouri Bible College
to raise the remainder of \$50,000
needed to procure the \$50,000 which
Mr. Long promised the college. The
extension of time was granted at the
request of G. D. Edwards, professor
of Old Testament history in the Bible
College, who is now in Kansas City.
About \$10,000 remains to be raised by
the college. Mr. Long made his \$50,-
000 gift on condition that the college
raise a corresponding amount by De-
cember 1.

"I have not heard from Mr. Long,"
said Dean Sharpe of the Bible College
this morning. "nor do I know what his
intentions are in regard to extending
the time limit. From what I know of
Mr. Long and his interest in the work,
I have no doubt whatever that he will
grant us an extension of at least two
weeks."

"KING" COLE TO TENNESSEE.

Johnny Bender May Be His Successor
at Nebraska.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 3.—Wil-
liam C. Cole, who has been three years
at the Nebraska University, has ac-
cepted the position of coach of Ten-
nessee University. The disastrous sea-
son of Tennessee University this year
has been attributed to Coach George
Levene, and when his contract had
expired he was told that another man
would be secured in his place. The
position at Tennessee will pay Cole
the same salary that he got at Ne-
braska University.

Cole is leaving Nebraska for the
same reason that Levene is leaving
Tennessee. When Kansas again de-
feated Nebraska at Lincoln this year
the talk of a new coach for the Corn-
huskers started. The defeat of the
Nebraskans by Johnny Bender's Has-
kell Indians was the final straw. Gen-
erally it is believed that Johnny
Bender will get the job.

FACULTY MUST O. K. BOOKS.

Then the University Buys Them for
the Library.

Before books can be purchased for
the University of Missouri library they
have to be "O. K'd" by the faculty
of the university. The publishers send
large consignments of books to the
library. When they arrive the libra-
rian, H. O. Severance, notifies the fac-
ulty. The professors choose what
books they consider helpful. They are
then ordered from the publishers. Mr.
Severance received yesterday a large
consignment from two companies. He
notified the faculty this morning to
choose the "helpful" books.

New Form of Gymnastics.

H. J. Norton, director of physical
training at Rollins Gymnasium, has
introduced a new form of exercise in
his classes. It is known as the "rhyth-
mical step work." It consists of fancy
dancing steps and is more strenuous
than the usual form of calisthenics.
Mr. Norton says a few minutes of this
exercise is more beneficial than any
other method of training.
