WHAT IS SUCCESS IN WATER-LIGHT PLANT

Earnings Should Provide for All Operating Expenses.

MUST MEET DEPRECIATION

Condition of Columbia's Equipment Rapidly Growing Worse.

"Successful operation of a water and light plant necessitates furnishing a reliable, continuous, and satisfactory supply of both water and light," says Dean H. B. Shaw's report to the city council upon the condition of the Columbia municipal plant. "It is now becoming customary to measure the excellence of service upon the basis of interruptions to it. Further, the plant must operate economically and earn enough profit to at least keep it properly maintained and pay a reasonable rate of interest on the investment.

"To secure reliable and economical operation a plant must be properly designed, carefully installed, substantially maintained and intelligently operated.

"The Columbia municipal plant is, we take it, not expected to realize profits since the first cost is supplied by bonds issued by the City and the interest and principal of these bonds is to be paid from a sinking fund collected by taxation. On the other hand, the street lighting and water for public service especially fire service, is supplied by the plant without any return in the way of income. But the earnings of the plant should be sufficient to provide for all operating expenses and in addition to provide at least sufficient to meet the inevitable depreciation.

"In general the service of the plant could hardly be termed satisfactory as there have been many interruptions to service. This has naturally been most noticeable in the electric supply and in the supply of water for fire service, though in this latter respect an insufficient fire department and the general combustible character of buildings prevents adequate fire protection with the best of service from the water plant. In the electrical operation there are flickerings, short interruptions due to "switching," and at times dim lights for considerable periods.

"Not only has the equipment depreciated considerably in value as shown by our estimate of valuation, but its condition is rapidly growing worse, as continuous operation, with the heavy loads on the boiler plant, the inadequacy of the steam piping and the uneconomical operation of the air compressors and deep well pumping, together with the labor required for firing such large quantities of coal, necessitates make-shift repairs, which in turn keep the plant continually on the verge of complete shutdown.

"The pumping of water from the deep well may be called the pivotal or crucial point in the operation of the plant. It should be remembered that under the best conditions and adjustments it requires a great deal of power to pump large quantities of water from some 200 feet below the surface of the ground, in wells of small diameter, and when the air compressors are working so uneconomically and continually needing repairs, the results will surely show in the coal bills."
